GNAC FOOTBALL ALL-TIME PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

2001

Sept. 2: Offense - Dustin Creager, Humboldt State (WR, 6-1, 186, Fr., Mission Viejo, CA - Santa Margarita) caught 10 passes for 119 yards, including four for scores (8, 4, 18 and 7) as the Lumberjacks rallied from a 34-21 fourth-quarter deficit to defeat Montana Tech 35-34. **Defense** - Elton Seals, Western Oregon (DB, 6-0, 210, Sr., Portland, OR - Benson & Bakersfield JC) preserved a 14-13 win for the Wolves with two fourth-quarter takeaways. He forced and recovered a fumble at the eight-yard line and intercepted a pass in the end zone in WOU's 14-13 win over Mesa State, Colo. Seals also was credited with eight tackles, including five solos.

Sept. 8: Offense - Scott Mitchell, Western Washington (QB, 6-3, 210, Sr., Kennewick, WA - Kamiakin). . . Mitchell completed 30 of 37 passes for 408 yards and four touchdowns and also rushed for 57 yards on 12 carries leading the Vikings to a 48-10 win over Fort Lewis. Mitchell's passing total was the first 400-yard game for a GNAC/CFA player since WWU's Sam Hanson threw for 480 yards against Humboldt State during the 1998 season. Mitchell, who has completed 38 of 49 passes and hasn't been intercepted so far this fall, needs just 67 more yards to become the 26th quarterback in Northwest small-college modern history (since 1985) to throw for 5,000 yards. He currently ranks 20th in career total offense with 5,447 yards. **Defense** - Jason Patterson, Central Washington (DB, 5-11, 185, Sr., Enumclaw). . . Patterson intercepted two passes and also broke up another pass in the Wildcats' come-from-behind 24-17 win over Willamette. His first interception came early in the second quarter on a third-and-five situation from the CWU 9 and prevented the Bearcats from extending their 14-3 lead. Then after the Wildcats rallied to tie the score at 17-17 in the fourth quarter, Patterson, who also had three tackles, claimed his 14th career interception with just three minutes remaining in the contest to set up CWU's game-winning 35-yard touchdown drive.

Sept. 15: Offense - Nyle Chambers, Western Washington (RB, 6-1, 220, So., Sumner, WA). . . Chambers ran for 122 yards and two touchdowns and also scored another touchdown on a 36-yard reception as the Vikings set a modern Northwest small-college record for points in a 77-0 thrashing of Montana - Western. Chambers caught three passes for 68 yards and finished with 190 all-purpose yards. **Defense** - Erik Totten, Western Washington (SS, 5-10, 195, Sr., Maple Valley, WA). . . Totten was credited with a team-high five tackles, including one for a loss of three yards, and also became the first player in Northwest small-college history to reach the 1,000 yard mark in career punt return yardage. Totten, who also has 1,063 career kickoff return yards, netted 68 yards on four punt returns to increase his career total to 1,002 yards. His average of 12.8 per return (on 78 returns) is currently the second best in Northwest small-college history behind Brad Taylor of Central Washington, who averaged 14.8 yards on 38 returns in the 1988 and 1989 seasons.

Sept. 22: Offense - Mike Hinshaw, Western Oregon (WR, 6-0, 190, So., Scappoose) - Hinshaw, who won the PacWest 100 and 200 meter titles last spring, caught seven passes for 134 yards, including touchdowns of 78 and 25 yards from Denny Bies and three yards from backup quarterback Bart Bishop in the Wolves' 43-32 loss to nationally-ranked UC Davis. **Defense** - Michael Koenen, Western Washington (P, 5-10, 165, Fr., Ferndale) - Koenen averaged 42.5 yards on 12 punts, including a school-record 67-yarder in the third quarter, and set a Northwest small-college record with his 510 punting yards. Damon Schaeffer of Southern Oregon against Humboldt State set the old mark of 500 in 1992.

Sept. 29: Offense - Nat Conley, Central Washington (RB, 6-0, 200, Sr., Pasco, WA) rushed for 188 yards and three touchdowns to lead the Wildcats to a 42-35 win over Montana - Western. Conley scored on runs of four, 36 and 80 yards. The latter TD was the longest scrimmage run by a CWU back since Kenny Thompson scored on a 94-yard run against Pacific Lutheran in 1991. **Defense** - Dave Morrill, Western Oregon (LB, 6-3, 245, Jr., Scappoose) had a team-high 10 tackles, including six primaries, to anchor the Wolf defense, which limited Division I-AA Southern Utah to 192 yards and a single field goal in a 16-3 win. Among Morrill's tackles were two for losses of six yards.

Oct. 6: Offense - Nyle Chambers, Western Washington (RB, 6-1, 220, So., Sumner) rushed for 90 yards on 21 rushes and caught six passes for 100 yards to lead the Vikings to a 45-28 win over South Dakota State. Chambers scored twice in the third quarter on a 10-yard pass from Scott Mitchell and on a six-yard run as Western, which led 24-21 at halftime, outscored SDSU 14-0 in the period. On the first drive, he accounted for 77 of the 78 yards and on the second drive he gained 45 of the 54 yards. **Defense** - Adam Angeli, Humboldt State (LB, 6-2, 245, Jr., Guernville, CA - Mendocino) had nine tackles, including three quarterback sacks for losses of 21 yards, as the Lumberjacks held Azusa Pacific to 118 rushing yards in a 31-28 win at the Redwood Bowl. The victory snapped a four-game losing streak for the Lumberjacks.

Oct. 13: Offense - Scott Mitchell, Western Washington (QB, 6-3, 210, Sr., Kennewick, WA - Kamiakin) and Jacob Kadle, Humboldt State (QB, 6-2, 215, Sr., Arcata, CA - College of the Redwood). . . Mitchell completed 25 of 44 passes for 313 yards and three touchdowns and also rushed for a team-high 65 yards and one touchdown to lead the Vikings to a 36-14 win over Central Washington. . . Kadle engineered one of the greatest comebacks in Northwest small-college history, completing 23 of 46 passes for 376 yards and four touchdowns as the Lumberjacks rallied from a 31-7 halftime deficit to defeat Western Oregon 34-31. **Defense** - Chris Walters, Humboldt State (LB, 5-10, 210, Jr., Anaheim, CA - Santa Ana College) set up the winning touchdown with a 29-yard interception return and also had a team-high 16 tackles, including an eight-yard quarterback sack, in the Lumberjacks 34-31 come-from-behind non-conference victory over Western Oregon.

Oct. 20: Offense - Scott Mitchell, Western Washington (QB, 6-3, 210, Sr., Kennewick, WA - Kamiakin). . . Mitchell, who has completed 67.6 percent of his passes (the Northwest small-college record is 67.9) and has been intercepted just twice (his .009 percentage is on pace to break the Northwest small-college record of .010 set by Craig Kupp of Pacific Lutheran in 1989) completed 22 of 30 passes (including 17 of his first 19) for 380 yards and four touchdowns in a 41-7 win at Humboldt State. Mitchell became the 11th player in Northwest small-college history to gain 7,000 yards in total offense. He currently ranks ninth on the career chart with 7,223. **Defense** - Brinton Smith, Western Oregon (DB, 6-3, 205, So., Portland, OR - Madison). . . Smith, making his first start, led the Wolves with 14 tackles, including nine primaries, and also intercepted two passes to lead the defense, which limited Central Washington to just 230 yards in total offense. Smith returned one of his thefts 36 yards to set up WOU's third-quarter touchdown in a 14-2 victory. Among his tackles was one for a three-yard loss. He was also credited with two pass breakups.

GNAC FOOTBALL ALL-TIME PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

Oct. 27: Offense - Nat Conley, Central Washington (RB, 6-0, 200, Sr., Pasco, WA) rushed for a school-record 322 yards and three touchdowns to lead the Wildcats to a 40-21 Homecoming win over Humboldt State. Conley, who carried the ball a school-record 40 times, scored on a one-yard run in the second quarter to put CWU ahead 17-14, then had clinching touchdown runs of 50 and 37 in the fourth quarter. **Defense** - Albert Meza, Western Oregon (DB, 6-1, 190, Sr., Canby, OR) had interception returns of 62 and 30 yards as the Wolf defense increased their season takeaway total to 26 in holding an opponent to single-digit points for the third time in seven games. Meza also had three tackles, including one for a loss.

Nov. 3: Offense - Michael Koenen, Western Washington (K, 5-10, 165, Fr., Ferndale, WA) and Dustin Creager, Humboldt State (WR, 6-1, 186, Fr., Mission Viejo, CA). . .Koenen scored 16 points, kicking four field goals (32, 40, 37, 30) and four extra points leading the Vikings to a 46-14 win over Western Oregon. The victory enabled the Vikings to clinch their third straight conference title. . .Creager caught eight passes for 153 yards and three touchdowns. He now has 14 reception touchdowns, breaking the old single-season school mark of 13 set by Drew Roberts in 1960. **Defense:** Anthony Dalton, Western Washington (CB, 5-10, 190, Jr., Olympia, WA - River Ridge & Yuba JC). . .Dalton returned a fumble 40 yards for a touchdown to account for one of two defensive scores by the Vikings in a 32-point win over Western Oregon. He also had five primary tackles, including two quarterback sacks for losses of 19 yards. Dalton also forced two fumbles and broke up a pass.

Nov. 10: Offense - Jacob Kadle, Humboldt State (QB, 6-2, 215, Sr., Arcata, CA - College of the Redwoods) completed 34 of 56 passes for 280 yards and two touchdowns leading the Lumberjacks to a 24-22 win over Western Oregon. Kadle completed the season as the GNAC's leader in passing yards (3193), passing touchdowns (28) and total offense (289.2 yards per game). **Defense** - Lance Gibson, Central Washington (DE, 6-5, 245, Jr., Rupert, ID - Minico & WWCC) had 10 tackles, including six primaries and also had a one-yard QB sack, as the Wildcat defense blanked Simon Fraser 42-0, holding the Clan to just 202 yards. Gibson also recovered a fumble and broke up a pass.

2002

Aug. 30-31: Offense - Zak Hill, Central Washington (QB, 6-0, 185, Jr., Battle Ground - Prairie) set a GNAC and a Northwest small-college record for most consecutive completions and threw for 404 yards in a 74-41 rout of Fort Lewis. Hill, who did not play in the fourth quarter, completed 24 of 30 passes, including 15 in a row in the first half. He threw four touchdown passes, including two to Moses Lewis, and also rushed for a touchdown. **Defense** - Jeff Charleston, Western Oregon (DL, 6-4, 240, So., Dallas - Central) sparked a fourth-quarter Western Oregon comeback over Mesa State returning a fumble 26 yards for a touchdown. He also was credited with 2 ½ tackles for losses, including two sacks for losses totaling 10 yards.

Sept. 7: Offense, Zak Hill, Central Washington (QB, 6-0, 185, Jr., Battle Ground) - Hill completed 26 of 32 passes for 347 yards and four touchdowns and led the Wildcats on seven consecutive scoring drives (6 touchdowns, 1 field goal) in a 43-7 win over defending NCAA Division II national champion North Dakota. **Defense**, Lino Fenumiai, Western Washington (DT, 6-0, 270, So., Juneau, AK) had seven tackles, including three for losses of nine yards (one of which was an eight-yard quarterback sack).

Sept. 14: Offense, Greg Dykstra, Western Washington (WR, 6-1, 200, Sr., Everson, WA - Lynden Christian) scored four touchdowns, including one on a 58-yard punt return, to lead the Vikings to a 52-14 win over Fort Lewis. He had six receptions for 121 yards, scoring on catches of 23, 26 and 31 yards and finished with 179 all-purpose yards. **Defense**, Rob White, Western Washington (FS, 6-1, 220, So., Woodinville - Inglemoor) forced four fumbles, three of which the Vikings recovered, and also had an interception. He was also credited with a team-best nine tackles, including seven solos.

Sept. 21: Offense, Will Johnson, Central Washington (RB, 5-11, 220, So., Sarasota, Fla. - Booker) came off the bench to rush for 97 yards and a game-clinching touchdown as Central Washington defeated NCAA Division I-AA Saint Mary's, Calif., before 3,500 fans at Tomlinson Stadium. Johnson, a U.S. veteran who completed his military service while stationed at Fort Lewis, scored on a five-yard run with 1:34 left. His TD run capped off a 10-play, 67-yard drive, and consumed 3:36 on the clock. **Defense**, Chris Walters, Humboldt State (LB, 5-10, 215, Sr., Anaheim, CA - Santa Ana College) had a pass break on a fourth down situation in HSU territory late in the fourth-quarter to help preserve a 42-28 non-conference win over Willamette. He finished the contest with 11 tackles, including one for a five-yard loss.

Sept. 28: Offense - Josh Shimek, Western Washington (QB, 6-4, 220, Jr., Pasco) completed 15 of 20 passes for 162 yards and three touchdowns as the Vikings stayed unbeaten with a three-point road win at NCAA Division I-AA Saint Mary's. After the Gaels had taken a four-point lead with 5:37 remaining, Shimek led WWU on a 74-yard, 10-play drive, which consumed all but 1:11 on the clock. He finished the drive off completing a 15-yard pass to Greg Dykstra for the winning touchdown. **Defense**- Marlo Airhart, Central Washington (DT, 6-2, 280, So., Seattle, WA - Mountlake Terrace) had five tackles, including back-to-back sacks late in the fourth quarter, which enabled the Wildcats to thwart a New Haven comeback and win their fifth consecutive game.

Oct. 5: Offense, Duncan Sherrard, Western Washington (RB, 5-10, 200, Fr., Seattle - Roosevelt) rushed for 151 yards, the second highest total this fall in the GNAC, including 112 in the third quarter, to key a 45-point second half as the Vikings ripped Western New Mexico 62-13. The WWU freshman back scored 14 points in the third quarter on runs of 16 and 26 along with a two-point conversion, then added six more in the fourth period on a four-yard run. **Defense**, Blake Walker, Central Washington (LB, 6-0, 220, So., Everett, WA - Cascade) accounted for more than a quarter of Central Washington's unassisted tackles in an impressive 15-point win over Montana State as the Wildcat defense had 53 yards in losses and held the Division I-AA Bobcats to just 31 net rushing yards. The CWU linebacker finished with 13 tackles, including 10 solos and three for losses totaling 14 yards. Two of the three were sacks (for losses of 12 yards).

Oct. 12: Offense, Brad Satran, Western Oregon (WR, 6-3, 180, Jr., Tigard, OR) caught eight passes for a school-record 225 yards, including touchdown receptions of 78, 81 and two yards in the Wolves' 34-3 win at University of San Diego. His 81-yarder is the second longest passing play this fall in the GNAC and the third longest in the two-year history of the conference and his 225 reception yards is the seventh best single-game total in Northwest small-college modern history (since 1985) and the highest total since Ben Clampitt of Western Washington set the record with 295 yards against Humboldt State in 1998. **Defense**, Tayt Tolman, Western Oregon (LB, 6-1, 205, Jr., Tangent, OR - South Albany) had 15 tackles (seven solos), including six for losses totaling 22 yards against San Diego. Two of the six were QB sacks. He also forced a fumble as WOU held USD to a single field goal.

GNAC FOOTBALL ALL-TIME PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

Oct. 19: Offense, Brian Potucek, Central Washington (WR, 6-0, 185, So., Tacoma - Clover Park). . caught a GNAC season-high 10 passes for 178 yards and a touchdown and also scored on a 32-yard reverse in the Wildcats' 35-28 home overtime win over Western Washington before a record crowd of 7,200 at Ellensburg. **Defense**, Nick Omatsu, Central Washington (DB, 5-5, 150, Jr., Redmond, WA - Eastlake) and Cody Killingsworth, Humboldt State (DB, 5-11, 195, Jr., Ferndale, CA - C. of the Redwood). . Omatsu, who also had three tackles, broke up three passes, including one on the final play of the game, which helped CWU preserve a 35-28 overtime win over Western Washington. Killingsworth was credited with seven tackles and also had 103 return yards, including 35 on an interception, 15 on one punt return and 53 on two kickoff returns.

Oct. 26: Offense, Steve Nichols, Western Washington (QB, 6-2, 210, So., Stevenson, WA), who was making his first career start, completed 18 of 28 passes for 310 yards and two touchdowns and was not intercepted as he led the Vikings to a 27-7 win over Humboldt State. **Defense**, Aaron Fontno, Central Washington (DB, 5-10, 160, Jr., Kent, WA - Kentwood & College of the Redwood) had 123 return yards, including 100 on six punt returns. His 63-yard return for a touchdown, which came right after a 42-yard touchdown run by Willie Johnson, enabled CWU to extend a 16-6 halftime lead to 30-6 midway through the third period and the Wildcats then went on to beat Western Oregon 40-13.

Nov. 2: Offense - Brad Satran, Western Oregon (WR, 6-3, 180, Jr., Tigard, OR) caught seven passes for 162 yards, including a 50-yard fourth-quarter reception, which snapped a 20-20 tie in the Wolves 34-20 win over NAIA nationally fifth-ranked Southern Oregon. **Defense** - Lance Gibson, Central Washington (DL, 6-5, 247, Sr., Rupert, ID) had a team-high seven tackles, including six solos, as the Wildcats ran their winning streak to 10 with a 41-14 road win against Humboldt State. Gibson, who leads the GNAC in tackles for losses (17 ½) and quarterback sacks (9), had three tackles behind the line of scrimmage for losses of 10 yards (including a five-yard QB sack).

Nov. 9: Offense - Brian Potucek, Central Washington (WR, 6-0, 185, So., Tacoma, WA - Clover Park) caught 10 passes for a career-high 180 yards and two touchdowns and had 241 all-purpose yards as the Wildcats beat UC Davis in a showdown of the top two teams in the NCAA Division II West Region poll. **Defense**, Blake Walker, Central Washington (LB, 6-0, 220, So., Everett, WA - Cascade HS) had a season-high 14 tackles, including eight solos. He also had two tackles for losses of 11 yards, including a nine-yard quarterback sack, as the Wildcats held the Aggies to a net 97 yards on 40 carries.

Nov. 16: Offense, Ivan McCrae, Western Oregon (RB, 5-10, 210, Jr., Keizer, OR - North Salem) rushed for 142 yards on 25 carries and set a GNAC record with four rushing touchdowns as the Wolves defeated Humboldt State 41-14. **Defense**, Dave Morrill, Western Oregon (LB, 6-3, 260, Sr., Warren, OR - Scappoose) had 12 tackles, including five solos and also had a tackle for a one-yard loss.

Nov. 23: Offense, Chris Dixon, Humboldt State (QB, 6-0, 195, Jr., El Sobrante, CA - Contra Costa JC) set GNAC records for total offense (493), passing yardage (455) and passing completions (39) in rallying the Lumberjacks from a 28-7 deficit against Sacramento State. After HSU pulled into a 35-35 tie with the Big Sky Division I school, the Hornets got the game-winning touchdown on a two-yard run by Andrew Bonner. **Defense**, Jeremy Jacobs, Central Washington (DB, 6-2, 195, Sr., Lakewood, WA - Lakes) had a CWU season-high 16 tackles, including eight solos in a 24-6 loss to UC Davis.

2003

Sept. 5-7: Offense, Brad Satran, Western Oregon (WR, 6-2, 185, Sr., Tigard, OR) - Satran caught 10 passes for 111 yards, including three catches during an 11-play, 74-yard drive which enabled the Wolves to tie the game with 14 seconds remaining and force overtime in a 23-22 win at Humboldt State. Satran also made two key special team contributions, blocking a punt, which resulted in a safety in the second quarter, and blocking an extra point attempt in the fourth period. **Defense**, Joe Smith, Central Washington (P, 6-2, 183, Jr., Enumclaw) averaged 48.7 yards on three punts, allowing just seven return yards, in the Wildcats' 24-7 win at Fort Lewis. Smith also kicked off five times, four times reaching the end zone (3 touchbacks). His fifth kickoff was from CWU's 25 because of a penalty and sailed 70 yards to the Skyhawk five-yard line.

Sept. 14: Offense, Dustin Creager, Humboldt State (WR, 6-1, 189, Jr., Ladera Ranch, CA - Santa Margarita) - Had seven receptions for 105 yards (his 13th career 100-yard reception game) to lead the Lumberjacks to a 14-point win over NCAA Division I-AA Saint Mary's. Among his seven catches were two leaping grabs in third-and-long situations that maintained scoring drives as he increased his two-game totals to 15 catches for 241 yards. **Defense**, Duval Seamster, Humboldt State (CB, 5-11, 190, Sr., Miami, Fla - U. Idaho) and Chad Boyd, Western Oregon (DB, 6-0, 205, So., Salem, OR - Sprague & Boise State). . Both players had three takeaways to lead their respective teams to victories over Saint Mary's, Calif., and Western Washington. Seamster had a GNAC-record three interceptions, including two in the end zone to snuff out scoring opportunities for the Gaels. Seamster also had four tackles, including one for a four-yard loss. Boyd intercepted two passes and recovered one fumble. His first interception at the WWU 15-yard line set up a six-yard touchdown run by Michael Ramirez just 1:37 into the contest. He also had three tackles, including a tackle for a loss.

Sept. 21: Offense, Zak Hill, Central Washington (QB, 6-0, 190, Sr., Battle Ground, WA - Prairie) and Andy Olson, Western Washington (WR, 6-3, 210, So., Chehalis, WA - West). . Hill completed 20 of 31 passes for 296 yards and four touchdowns to lead the Wildcats to a 41-3 win over Western New Mexico. The CWU QB has now thrown for 7,733 and 64 touchdowns and needs just 267 more yards to become just the fifth QB in Northwest small-college history to pass for 8,000 career yards. . Olson caught seven passes for 187 yards in a 52-28 loss to Nebraska-Omaha, matching the seventh-best single game receiving yardage total in WWU school history. **Defense**, Dustin Hawkins, Central Washington (DT, 6-2, 285, Jr., Spanaway, WA - Bethel) - Had eight tackles including 3 1/2 for losses of 18 yards (three of which were sacks) as the Wildcat defense had eight sacks and threw Western New Mexico backs for losses of 67 yards.

Sept. 28: Offense, Chris Dixon, Humboldt State (QB, 6-0, 202, Sr., Oakland, CA - Contra Costa) - Completed 41 of 48 passes for 401 yards and three touchdowns to lead the Lumberjacks to a 21-point win over Southern Oregon. Dixon, who completed 11 straight passes at one point and had three separate strings of seven consecutive completions, also finished with a GNAC season-best 459 yards in total offense. His 41 completions broke his own school and conference record of 39 he set last season against Sacramento State. **Defense**, Joey Joshua, Western Washington (DE, 6-4, 220, So., Ferndale) - Had 14 tackles, including one for an eight-yard loss on the final play of the game as the Vikings beat Division I-AA Saint Mary's, Calif., to end a two-season, four-game losing streak.

Oct. 4: Offense - Emilio Iniguez, Central Washington (RB, 5-9, 188, Jr., Puyallup, WA - Bethel) and Andy Olson, Western Washington (WR, 6-3, 210, So., Chehalis, WA - West) . . .Iniguez rushed for a career-high and GNAC season-best 140 yards on 32 carries, including a four-yard touchdown run in the third quarter that gave the Wildcats a 22-14 lead in a 29-20 victory over arch-rival Western Washington. Olson had 207 all-purpose yards for the Vikings, netting 160 yards on nine catches and returning three punts for a total of 47 yards. **Defense** - Nick Omatsu, Central Washington (DB, 5-6, 150, Sr., Redmond, WA - Eastlake) - For the second year in a row, Omatsu made the biggest defensive play against the Vikings, returning an interception 40 yards for a fourth-quarter touchdown. He also had an interception at the goal line with 4:42 remaining to snuff out a Viking scoring drive. Omatsu had three tackles and also broke up a pass. Last year, Omatsu broke up a pass on the final play of the game to preserve CWU's 35-28 overtime win against the Vikings.

Oct. 11: Offense, Chris Dixon, Humboldt State (QB, 6-0, 202, Sr., Oakland, CA – Contra Costa JC) had 280 yards of total offense, including 105 rushing on 20 carries, to lead the Lumberjacks to a 21-7 win over previously unbeaten Azusa Pacific. Dixon's rushing total was the most by a quarterback during the three-year history of the conference. He also completed 23 of 39 passes for 175 yards and a touchdown. **Defense** , Cody Killingsworth, Humboldt State (DB, 5-11, 212, Sr., Ferndale, CA – College of the Redwoods) had 95 return yards, including 84 on two kickoffs. His 57-yard return set up a one-yard second quarter touchdown run by Adrian Waddy, which snapped a 7-7 tie. Killingsworth also was credited with four tackles, had an interception, broke up a pass and forced a fumble leading the Lumberjacks to their third consecutive victory.

Oct. 18: Offense, Ivan McCrae, Western Oregon (RB, 5-10, 215, Sr., Keizer, OR – North Salem) – Had 158 all-purpose yards, including 126 rushing, 15 on one reception, nine on one punt return and eight on one kickoff return, in leading the Wolves to a 20-point road win at Western New Mexico. **Defense** , Mitch Richards, Central Washington (LB, 5-9, 230, Sr., Stanwood, WA – Lakewood) – Credited with 10 tackles, including 2 ½ for losses of 15 yards as the Wildcats defeated Humboldt State in the conference opener for both schools.

Oct. 25: Offense, Duncan Sherrard, Western Washington (RB, 5-10, 195, So., Seattle, WA – Roosevelt) rushed for 93 yards and also caught one pass for eight yards as the Vikings beat arch-rival Central Washington. Sherrard scored the game-winning TD on a one-yard run with 43 seconds remaining and also set up the Vikings' first touchdown with a 46-yard scamper. **Defense** , Lann Olson, Western Washington (LB, 6-0, 215, Sr., Chehalis, WA – West) led the Viking defense, which held Central to just 294 yards, including 75 yards and three first downs in the second half.

Nov. 1: Offense, Zak Hill, Central Washington (QB, 6-0, 190, Sr., Battleground, WA - Prairie) completed 23 of 31 passes for 329 yards and five touchdowns to lead the Wildcats to an 11-point win over Western Oregon. Hill's five TD passes equaled a GNAC record and his six touchdowns (including a rushing TD) set a new conference mark. **Defense** , John Shields, Western Washington (CB, 5-11, 190, Jr., Spanaway, WA – Bethel & College of the Siskiyous) intercepted a pass at the Viking three-yard line in the second quarter to thwart a Humboldt State scoring drive and recovered a fumble to set up the clinching touchdown as the Vikings clinched at least a tie for their fourth conference title in five years with a 14-point road win at Arcata. Shields also broke up another pass and had five tackles, including four unassisted tackles.

Nov. 8: Offense, Jake Roberts, Central Washington (WR, 6-3, 195, Sr., Spokane, WA – University) contributed to four of the Wildcats' five touchdowns in a 39-6 win against New Haven. Roberts, who leads the GNAC in scoring, had touchdown catches of eight, 12 and 10 and also threw a 41-yard pass to Moses Lewis to set up a 12-yard TD run by Emilio Iniguez. **Defense** , Chad Boyd, Western Oregon (DB, 6-0, 205, So., Salem, OR – Sprague) had eight tackles, including three for losses of 10 yards in a 24-20 win over Humboldt State. Among the tackles was a six-yard QB sack. He also forced a fumble and broke up two passes.

Nov. 15: Offense, Ivan McCrae, Western Oregon (RB, 5-10, 215, Sr., Keizer, OR) rushed for 103 yards, averaging 6.4 per carry, and also had two receptions for five yards and 32 yards on a kickoff return in a 17-13 loss to conference champion Western Washington. **Defense** , Jesse Looker, Western Washington (OLB, 5-10, 210, Sr., Puyallup, WA – Santa Rosa JC) had seven tackles, including three for losses of 15 yards, and also forced a fumble to lead the defense, which held Western Oregon to just one touchdown in a 13-10 victory as the Vikings won their fourth conference title in the last five years (and their sixth in the past nine seasons).

Nov. 22: Offense, Chris White, Humboldt State (WR, 5-11, 175, Sr., Fort Bragg, CA – College of the Redwoods) caught 12 passes for 178 yards and a touchdown. White, who finished his two-year career at HSU with 105 catches for 1256 yards, won the GNAC reception title with 77 catches for 916 yards. **Defense**, None selected.

Aug. 28: Offense - Jason Baughman, Humboldt State (QB, 6-0, 185, Sr., Anaheim, CA) and Nate Brookreson, Central Washington (WR, 6-1, 196, Jr., Lacey, WA – North Thurston) . . .Baughman completed 19 of 27 passes for 286 yards and a school-record tying five touchdowns in Humboldt's 42-14 home win over Menlo. Brookreson caught 11 passes for a school and GNAC record 236 yards, including an 84-yard TD reception in a 27-21 overtime loss to defending NAIA national champion Carroll College. **Defense** - Christian Hodges, Humboldt State (DB, 6-0, 208, Sr., San Diego, CA – Western Michigan) led the Lumberjacks with nine tackles, including six solos. He also forced a fumble, had a pass break and returned an interception 30 yards.

Sept. 3-4: Offense - Emilio Iniguez, Central Washington (RB, 5-10, 210, Sr., Puyallup, WA – Bethel) rushed for a career-high 219 yards on 39 carries, including TD runs of one and 10 yards, to lead the Wildcats to a 17-point home win over Montana – Western. **Defense** - Craig Keenan, Western Washington (OLB, 6-1, 220, Jr., Salem, MA – Palomar JC) and Blake Walker, Central Washington (LB, 6-1, 234, Sr., Everett, WA) . . .Keenan had 12 tackles, including six primaries, and also came up with a key fourth-quarter fumble recovery to stop a Fort Lewis drive at the Viking 29 in a two-point WWU victory. Walker returned two interceptions for a total of 20 yards and also had two tackles. His first interception came at Montana-Western's 34 in the third quarter and set up Iniguez's second TD run. His second interception came at CWU's 24 to thwart a Bulldog fourth-quarter scoring drive.

Sept. 11: Offense - Dustin Creager, Humboldt State (WR, 6-1, 198, Sr. Mission Viejo, Calif.) had seven catches for 94 yards and a touchdown and returned three punts for 24 yards in the Jacks' win over Southern Oregon. **Defense** - Kyle Killingsworth, Humboldt State (DB, 5-10, 195, So., Ferndale, CA) had a team-high eight tackles, six of them solos, as the Jacks' defense shut down Southern Oregon. Killingsworth also forced a fumble as the Lumberjacks recorded their first shutout since 1998.

Sept. 18: Offense - Steve Nichols, Western Washington (QB, 6-2, 210, Sr., Stevenson, WA) completed 28 of 41 passes for 276 yards and four touchdowns as the Vikings beat Nebraska Omaha, which was ranked 23 rd in last week's AFCA national poll, 31-21. Nichols tossed touchdown passes of 12, 13, 20 and 11 yards, including three of them in the first half when WWU built a 24-6 lead. **Defense** - Felix Bobo, Humboldt State (LB, 6-2, 248, Sr., Moreno Valley, CA – Riverside) had 12 tackles, including six solos in a 17-10 loss to the Cougars. Two of Bobo's tackles were for losses totaling three yards.

Sept. 25: Offense - Dustin Creager, Humboldt State (WR, 6-1, 198, Sr., Mission Viejo, CA – Santa Margarita) caught a school and GNAC-record 15 passes for 204 yards to lead the Lumberjacks to their first conference win since 2001. Creager now has 248 career receptions for 3,457 yards. "He's a great player and he's finishing off a great four years," Humboldt State head coach Doug Adkins said, assessing Creager's performance. "By the time its over, he'll probably hold every record. He's quite possibly the best player in the history of Humboldt State football." **Defense** - Jeff Parks, Western Washington (OLB, 6-3, 215, So., Graham, WA – Bethel & Boise State) had 11 tackles, including two sacks for losses of 11 yards. He also shared in another tackle for loss of two yards, forced a fumble and broke up a pass as the Vikings rallied from a 21-10 deficit to beat Central Washington before 11,458 fans at Qwest Stadium.

Oct. 2: Offense - Denny Bies, Western Oregon (QB, 6-2, 205, Jr., Tualatin, OR) completed 35 of 62 passes for a GNAC season-high 399 yards and five touchdowns twice rallying the Wolves from double-digit deficits to beat Western Washington. Bies tied a school-record for pass completions and equaled GNAC single-game records for passing touchdowns and two-point conversions (2). **Defense** - Bret Hughes, Western Oregon (DB-WR, 6-1, 220, Jr., Salem, OR - McKay) – Had six touches, catching three passes for 29 yards and tying a GNAC record with three interceptions (returning them 43 yards) as he became the first player in modern Northwest small-college history (since 1985) to score touchdowns on both offense and defense in the same game. Hughes also had five tackles, including one for a two-yard loss.

Oct. 9: Offense - James Monrean, Western Washington (QB, 6-1, 225, So., Bellingham, WA – Sehome) equaled a school and GNAC record by throwing five touchdown passes in a 42-13 home win against Saint Joseph, Ind. Monrean, who was making his first career start, completed 12 of 24 passes for 190 yards and also added 20 yards on the ground in six carries. **Defense** - Jacob Galloway, Central Washington (DE, 6-5, 235, Sr., Shelton, WA) set a GNAC single-game record for tackles for losses with six (for losses of 13 yards) as the Wildcat defense didn't allow a touchdown for the second consecutive game in a 31-7 home win against Eastern Oregon. Galloway finished with a team-best eight tackles, including seven solos.

Oct. 16: Offense - Lionel Arnold, Humboldt State (RB, 6-0, 228, Jr., Richmond, CA – Contra Costa) rushed for 110 yards on 14 carries, including runs of 15 and 49 yards on the first two plays of the Lumberjacks' winning touchdown drive late in the fourth quarter to lead his team to its first road win in nine starts. **Defense** - Blake Walker, Central Washington (LB, 6-1, 234, Sr., Everett, WA – Cascade) had takeaways on two consecutive Western Oregon possessions in the fourth quarter and also sparked a CWU defense that held the Wolves to minus 6 yards rushing in a 12-point home win. Walker, who also had eight tackles including 1 ½ for losses of four yards, recovered a muffed punt to set up CWU's clinching touchdown in the fourth quarter. Then on WOU's next possession he intercepted a pass at the CWU 44 after the Wolves had driven into Wildcat territory.

Oct. 23: Offense - Andy Olson, Western Washington (WR, 6-2, 210, Jr., Chehalis, WA – W.F. West) caught six passes for 89 yards, including first-half touchdown receptions of 16 and 24 yards. The two TD catches gave Olson, who leads the GNAC in scoring with 11 touchdowns, a touchdown reception in a school record tying seven consecutive games (one short of the GNAC record). **Defense** - Dustin Hawkins, Central Washington (DT, 6-3, 290, Sr., Spanaway, WA – Bethel) led another impressive performance by CWU's defensive front, which held Humboldt State to just 44 rushing yards and 173 yards in total offense in a 13-3 win. Hawkins had eight tackles, including 3 ½ for losses totaling 10 yards. **Special Teams** – Michael Koenen, Western Washington (K-P, 5-11, 195, Sr., Ferndale, WA) – Averaged 54.2 yards, including a long of 61, on four punts Also had three touchbacks on kickoffs and connected on all seven of his extra point attempts, increasing his career point total to 254, 13 short of the all-time Northwest small-college kick scoring record.

Oct. 30: Offense - Dustin Creager, Humboldt State (WR, 6-1, 198, Sr., Mission Viejo, CA – Santa Margarita) caught 14 passes for 211 yards and scored 14 fourth-quarter points as the Lumberjacks rallied in the final period to defeat Western Oregon 39-33. Creager scored on catches of 10 and eight yards, the former that put the Lumberjacks on top for good, and also added a two-point conversion. **Defense** – Mike Romero, Central Washington (DE, 6-4, 255, Sr., Spokane, WA – Lewis & Clark & EWU) had eight tackles, including two quarterback sacks for losses of 21, as the Wildcats rallied from a 17-3 second-half deficit to defeat Western Washington 31-17 and clinch no worse than a tie for the conference title. One of Romero's sacks resulted in a game-tying touchdown when fellow defensive end Jacob Galloway scooped up Steve Nichols' fumble at the three and carried it into the end zone. Romero's eight tackles was one shy of a career high.

Nov. 6: Offense - Steve Nichols, Western Washington (QB, 6-2, 210, Sr., Stevenson, WA) completed 16 of 24 passes for 268 yards and three touchdowns and was not intercepted as the Vikings defeated Humboldt State 55-20. Nichols, who finished his career with 5,128 passing yards, directed the Vikings on scoring drives on their first six possessions. **Defense** – Ryan Andrews, Central Washington (DB, 6-0, 200, So., Marysville, WA – Lake Stevens) – Prevented two possible Western Oregon touchdowns intercepting passes at the CWU 2 in the second quarter and at the 1 in the final period as the Wildcats held on to defeat Western Oregon 26-21. Andrews also broke up a pass and had two tackles.

Aug. 27: Offense - James Monrean, Western Washington (QB, 6-1, 230, Jr., Bellingham, WA - Sehome) – completed two-thirds of his passes (20 of 30) for 266 yards and four touchdowns as the Vikings earned a 29-point road win at Mesa State. **Defense** - None selected.

Sept. 3: Offense - Darren Ross, Humboldt State (WR, 6-1, 194, Jr., Long Beach, CA) had 11 receptions for 113 yards and three touchdowns (8, 14 and 42) to lead the Lumberjacks to 28-9 win over Mesa State. Ross' first TD catch, which came with 21 seconds remaining in the third quarter, enabled the 'Jacks to overcome a 9-8 deficit. **Defense** - Jon Apgar, Western Oregon (LB, 6-3, 250, Sr., Toledo, OR) had nine tackles, including a pair of quarterback sacks for losses of eight yards as the Wolves posted their first shutout in nearly five years with a 35-0 win over Willamette. WOU, which allowed an average of 41 points and 451 yards per game last season, held Willamette to just 172 yards, including only 70 on the ground.

Sept. 10: Offense - Brian Potucek, Central Washington (WR, 6-0, 193, Sr., Lakewood, WA – Clover Park) caught a career-high 15 passes for 129 yards and a touchdown in the Wildcats' 28-21 loss to nationally fifth-ranked Nebraska Omaha. Potucek now has 236 career catches for 3,243 yards and a total of 4,135 all-purpose yards. All three marks rank second in GNAC history behind Humboldt State's Dustin Creager (2001-04), who finished his career with 293 catches for 3,929 yards and 4,226 all-purpose yards. **Defense** - Kyle Killingsworth, Humboldt State (DB, 5-11, 195, Jr., Ferndale, CA) had 101 yards on returns, including an 89-yard punt return for a touchdown. He also had five tackles and broke up a pass as the Lumberjacks held Menlo to 263 yards in total offense in a 60-14 victory.

Sept. 17: Offense - Mike Reilly, Central Washington (QB, 6-4, 201, Fr., Kalispell, MT – Flathead) completed 19 of 32 passes for 338 yards and three touchdowns and didn't throw an interception in leading the Wildcats to a six-point win over nationally 24 th ranked Washburn. It was Reilly's fourth consecutive 200-yard passing game and his second straight 300-yard game. The Washington State transfer leads the GNAC in total offense (1,177), passing yards (1,089), passing touchdowns (11) and passing efficiency (146.3). **Defense** - Kyle Killingsworth, Humboldt State (DB, 5-11, 195, Jr., Ferndale, CA) set up the clinching touchdown with a 50-yard punt return, then sealed the win with an interception with 1:31 remaining as the Lumberjacks edged Southern Oregon to stay unbeaten in three games. Killingsworth also had seven tackles and broke up a pass.

Sept. 24: Offense - Eliot Vinzant, Western Oregon (RB, 6-0, 215, Jr., Scappoose, OR) posted the first 100-yard rushing game in the GNAC this fall, netting 147 yards. The Portland State transfer, who averaged 6.7 yards on 22 carries, scored on runs of four and 40 yards in the third and fourth quarters, respectively, in a 24-10 win over Southern Oregon. **Defense** - Brian Iriye, Humboldt State (LB, 6-0, 220, Jr., Lindsay, CA – Fresno City) had a GNAC season-high 16 tackles, including four solos in the Lumberjacks' 13-12 loss to Azusa Pacific. APU scored 13 first-quarter points before getting its initial first down and then was blanked the remainder of the way by the Raider defense.

Oct. 1: Offense - Jake Carlyle, Western Washington (RB, 5-7, 195, Sr., Olympia, WA – Capital) rushed for a GNAC season-best 175 yards on 31 carries helping the Vikings control the ball for 37 minutes, 17 seconds, including the final 7:06 in a five-point home win over Humboldt State. **Defense** - Jason Gran, Central Washington (SS, 6-1, 195, Fr., Buckley, WA – White River) had a key interception at the five-yard line to thwart a Western Oregon scoring drive, broke up another pass and also had a team-high 11 tackles to lead the Wildcats to a 31-point road win at Western Oregon.

Oct. 8: Offense - Mike Reilly, Central Washington (QB, 6-4, 201, Fr., Kalispell, MT) had 321 yards in total offense leading the Wildcats to a 20-point win in the third annual "Battle in Seattle". Reilly completed 22 of 34 passes for 247 yards and three touchdowns and also netted 74 yards on 11 rushes. He has now thrown for 1,623 yards and 19 touchdowns in six games, surpassing the 200 yard mark in all six. **Defense** - Chris Burch, Central Washington (LB, 6-1, 202, Jr., Inchelium, WA) had 13 tackles, including seven solos, and also had a fumble recovery at CWU's one-yard line and a five-yard tackle for loss. After Burch's recovery, the Wildcats drove 99 yards for a touchdown, beginning a string of 23 unanswered points.

Oct. 15: Offense - Mike Reilly, Central Washington (QB, 6-4, 201, Fr., Kalispell, MT – Flathead) and Duncan Sherrard, Western Washington (RB, 5-9, 200, Sr., Seattle, WA – Roosevelt). . Reilly became the first quarterback in CWU history to throw for at least 200 yards and rush for 100 in the same game as he completed 27 of 41 passes for 281 yards and netted 102 yards on 11 rushes. He tossed touchdown passes of 13 yards to Josh Boonstra and 20 to Brian Potucek and also scored on a six-yard run as the Wildcats ran their win streak to four in a 30-7 win over Humboldt State. . Sherrard, who has been hindered by a knee injury most of the season, rushed for 158 yards on 25 carries (including 101 on 15 first-half carries) as the Vikings defeated Western Oregon 38-16. Sherrard now ranks second in GNAC history in career rushing with 2,560 yards. **Defense** - Brandon Elliott, Western Washington (MLB, 6-2, 235, So., Auburn, WA – Fife) had 11 tackles, including eight unassisted, in the Vikings' 22-point road win. Among his tackles was a six-yard quarterback sack that stalled one Wolf drive near midfield.

Oct. 22: Offense – Nate Brookreson, Central Washington (WR, 6-1, 195, Sr., Lacey, WA – North Thurston) caught seven passes for 117 yards and three touchdowns as the Wildcats opened up a 55-19 halftime lead on the way to a 61-33 win over Western Oregon. Brookreson has 11 touchdowns this fall and leads the conference in scoring with 66 points. He is the GNAC leader in receiving yards with 790 and also ranks 10th in GNAC history in career receiving with 1,719 yards on 112 catches. **Defense** – Brandon Kennedy, Central Washington (CB, 5-9, 163, Fr., Spokane, WA – Gonzaga Prep) and Steve Davis, Western Washington (SS, 5-9, 190, Fr., Kennewick, WA – Kamiakin). . Kennedy set GNAC single-game and season records for interception touchdowns and tied the career record as he returned two for TDs (36 and 30 yards). The 18-year-old "true" freshman has four interceptions, returning three of them for touchdowns. His 163 return yards is a conference single-season record and ranks third on the GNAC career chart. . Davis had a team-high 10 tackles, including six solos, and also forced a fumble as the Vikings rallied from a 21-7 halftime deficit to defeat Humboldt State 28-24.

Oct. 29: Offense – Mark Thorson, Western Oregon (QB, 6-5, 215, So., Sandy, OR) and Landon Hall, Central Washington (RB, 5-11, 225, Sr., Edmonds, WA – Edmonds-Woodway). . Thorson and Hall led their respective teams to come-from-behind victories. Thorson tossed two TD passes in the final 4:31 as the Wolves overcame an 11-point deficit to defeat Humboldt State 39-35. The sophomore QB completed 23 of 40 passes for 273 yards and four touchdowns. . Hall had 109 of his 133 rushing yards after intermission as Central scored 24 second-half points to rally from a 28-7 halftime deficit to beat Western Washington 31-28 and clinch the GNAC title. **Defense** – Shane Simmons, Western Washington (OLB, 6-1, 215, So., Kent, WA – Kentlake) had a team-high nine tackles (four solos), including a 10-yard quarterback sack. He also shared another tackle for a two-yard loss. Simmons also intercepted a pass returning it six yards and forced a fumble to set up two of WWU's four first-half touchdowns. In addition, he recovered a fumble and broke up a pass.

Nov. 5: Offense – Landon Hall, Central Washington (RB, 5-11, 225, Sr., Edmonds, WA – Edmonds-Woodway) and Eliot Vinzant, Western Oregon (RB, 6-0, 215, Jr., Scappoose, OR). . Hall netted 150 yards on 26 carries, including 70 on CWU's opening touchdown drive in which he carried on every play but one, to lead the Wildcats to a 14-point road win at Arcata. He also caught a team-high seven passes for 45 yards as the Wildcats finished their season with a seven-game win streak. Vinzant paced Western Oregon with 160 yards, the second highest total this fall in the GNAC, and two touchdowns on 29 carries as the Wolves upset Western Washington. The WOU junior ran his streak of 100-yard games to six and upped his season total to a GNAC-best 948 yards. He'll need just 52 more in the Wolves' season finale this Saturday to crack the 1,000-yard barrier. **Defense** – Bret Hughes, Western Oregon (DB, 6-1, 225, Sr., Salem, OR - McKay) had a GNAC record-tying three interceptions, two of them in the end zone to kill Western Washington drives as the Wolves defeated the Vikings 28-7. Hughes, who has five interceptions this season, also was credited with a pair of tackles. He tied his own GNAC single-game record for interceptions he set last year against WWU.

Nov. 12: Offense – Mark Thorson, Western Oregon (QB, 6-5, 215, So., Sandy, OR) completed 17 of 30 passes for 246 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Wolves to their third straight win. Thorson finished the season with a school-record 186 completions in 339 attempts for 1,916 yards and 16 touchdowns. **Defense** – Josh Costa, Humboldt State (LB, 6-2, 240, Jr., Visalia, CA – Fresno City) had 13 tackles, including seven solos and also forced two fumbles, one that directly led to the Lumberjacks' first touchdown in a 19-7 win over Southern Oregon. Costa finished the season as the second-leading tackler in the conference ending up with exactly 100.

2008

Week of Aug. 24-31: Offense - Jared Bronson, Central Washington (TE, 6-4, 255, Sr., Kent, WA – Thomas Jefferson & UW) caught four passes for a career-high 146 yards, scored twice and set up a third touchdown in leading the Wildcats to a 44-38 overtime road win at Dixie State. In the first quarter his 17-yard reception to the eight set up a one-yard TD run by J.R. Hasty. He then scored on a 63-yard pass from Mike Reilly in the second quarter and his 24-yard TD in the fourth quarter briefly gave CWU a 35-31 lead with 2:07 left. **Defense** - Teddy Owens, Dixie State (LB, 6-0, 225, Jr., Pleasant Grove, UT) had a game-high 13 tackles, including eight solos as Dixie came within three seconds of knocking off the nationally 11th-ranked Wildcats before 2,891 fans at St. George, Utah. Owens also forced and recovered a fumble and combined with Kevin Wilks for a eight-yard sack. **Special Teams** - Garrett Rolsma, Central Washington (6-0, 197, Jr., University Place, WA – Curtis) connected on a 44-yard field goal as time expired to force overtime. He was also perfect on five extra points, averaged 49.7 yards on six kickoffs and surrendered just 13 return yards on punts of 38 and 34 yards.

Week of Sept. 1-7: Offense - D.J. Jackson, Western Oregon (RB, 6-1, 215, So., Portland, OR – Jesuit) and Mike Reilly, Central Washington (QB, 6-3, 212, Sr., Kalispell, MT – Flathead). . Jackson averaged 10.2 yards, netting 132 yards on 13 carries, in a 36-27 conference road win at Western Washington. On WOU's third quarter touchdown that gave it a 23-20 lead, he had runs of 45 and seven yards to set up a two-yard TD pass from Josh Riddell to Demario Ballard. Then in the fourth quarter, Jackson had runs of 21 and 13 yards on the first two plays of a 99-yard, 11-play drive as the Wolves got the clinching touchdown on a 16-yard run by Ben Kuenzi. . Reilly had 357 yards in total offense, increasing his career total to 10,334, in CWU's 48-14 win over Mesa State. He completed 17 of 24 passes for 293 yards and four touchdowns and also netted 64 yards on eight rushes and was not sacked. **Defense** - Chad Frank, Dixie State (DE, 6-0, 245, Jr., Albuquerque, NM – Sandia) had seven tackles, including two quarterback

sacks for losses of 22 yards and another tackle for a one-yard loss as Dixie set GNAC records for fewest rushing yards allowed (minus 51) and lowest yards allowed per play (1.2). Frank was also credited with a forced fumble, a pass breakup and three quarterback hurries in a 35-3 victory against Western New Mexico. **Special Teams** – Courtney Smith, Central Washington (CB, 5-11, 200, Sr., Stockton, CA – East Union) set up the Wildcats' first touchdown blocking a punt and scored its fourth touchdown returning a kickoff 95 yards for a score. In all Smith had 129 all-purpose yards. He was also credited with three tackles, including two solos.

Week of Sept. 8-14: Offense - Johnny Spevak, Central Washington (WR, 6-3, 200, Jr., Edgewood, WA – Puyallup) caught 11 passes for 197 yards, including touchdown receptions of four and 71 yards as the Wildcats rallied from a 24-10 second-half deficit to beat Western Oregon at McArthur Field. His second TD reception snapped a 24-24 tie with 5:54 remaining in the fourth quarter. **Defense** - Caleb Jessup, Western Washington (LB, 6-0, 220, Jr., Kenmore, WA – Inglemoor) had a GNAC season-best 15 tackles and participated in two key quarterback sacks as the Viking defense limited Humboldt State to 53 second-half yards in a 30-14 win. Officially, Jessup was credited with 2 ½ tackles for losses (of 11 yards) and 1 ½ sacks (10 yards). **Special Teams** – David Johnson, Western Washington (LB, 6-2, 215, Fr. Odessa, WA) had a momentum-changing blocked punt in the final minute of the first half in the Vikings' 30-14 road win at Arcata. One play later Pat McCann scored on an 11-yard pass from Adam Perry to tie the game at 14-14. WWU then added 16 unanswered points in the second half as it snapped a six-game losing streak dating back to its final five games of the 2007 season.

Week of Sept. 15-21: Offense - Adam Perry, Western Washington (QB, 6-0, 190, Sr., Longview, WA – R.A. Long) engineered an offense that gained a total of 515 yards and scored 31 points against Eastern Washington, the nation's No. 14th ranked NCAA Division I Championship Subdivision team. Perry completed 24 of 37 passes for 349 yards and two touchdowns. He also rushed for two touchdowns. The Viking senior QB finished with 361 yards in total offense, 10 more yards than the Eagles surrendered to the entire University of Colorado offense in a 31-24 loss earlier this season in Boulder. **Defense** - Matt Cox, Western Oregon (DT, 6-0, 260, Sr., Salem, OR – North Salem) and Ryan Dyer, Central Washington (DE, 6-0, 235, Jr., University Place, WA – Life Christian). . Cox had extraordinary numbers for a defensive tackle earning nine tackles, including 3 ½ for losses totaling 22 yards as the Wolves earned a 34-27 road win at Dixie State. He also had 1 ½ QB sacks including a key nine-yard sack to snuff out Dixie's final scoring opportunity. On the season, Cox is tied for the GNAC lead in tackles for losses with seven. . Dyer, who is the conference leader in sacks with 5 ½, had four of them for losses of 31 yards as Central Washington beat Humboldt State 48-10 to improve to 4-0. Dyer had a team-best seven tackles and also forced a fumble. **Special Teams** – Jon Dowd, Western Oregon (DB, 5-11, 205, Jr., Corvallis, WA – Crescent Valley) had kickoff returns of 32, 27 and 29 yards. The 32-yarder came off a lateral and helped set up a field goal in WOU's victory. Dowd, who leads the GNAC in kick returns averaging 28.5, also made contributions on defense, earning four tackles and forcing a fumble.

GNAC FOOTBALL ALL-TIME PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

Week of Sept. 22-28: Offense - Pat McCann, Western Washington (WR, 6-2, 205, Jr., Olympia, WA – College of the Canyons) caught eight passes for 232 yards and three touchdowns, including a GNAC-record 96 yarder, to lead the Vikings to a 29-27 home win against Dixie State. McCann also scored on catches of 11 and 40 yards. His yardage total was the second most in GNAC history, and was the most ever for a conference contest.

Defense - Buddy Wood, Central Washington (LB, 6-3, 200, Jr. Chattaroy, WA - Riverside) had 13 tackles, including a 15-yard quarterback sack, and also contributed to three of CWU's five takeaways in a 38-35 loss to Montana. He recovered a fumbled punt to set up CWU's first touchdown, then forced and recovered a fumble returning it 20 yards for the Wildcats' second touchdown. He also forced a fumble in the third quarter to halt a Montana drive at CWU's 23. The Wildcats, however, gave that one back on a fumble four plays later leading to a Grizzly score. **Special Teams** – Josh Lider, Western Washington (K, 6-2, 195, Jr., Bellevue, WA – Sammamish) and Garrett Rolsma, Central Washington (K, 6-0, 197, Jr., University Place, WA – Curtis). . Both Lider and Rolsma had clutch field goals in the closing minutes of their respective games. Lider kicked two field goals in the final six minutes, including a 34-yarder to pull WWU within one point at 5:15 and then a 27-yarder game-winner with four seconds left. He also had a 28-yarder in the second quarter. . Rolsma nailed a 44-yarder to pull CWU into a 35-35 tie with Montana with 2:47 left. He also connected from 23 yards on the final play of the first half. His two field goals were the 25th and 26th of his career, breaking the CWU school-record of 25 set by CWU Hall-of-Famer Craig Warmenhoven between 1983 and 1986. Rolsma also averaged a season-best 45.2 yards on four punts and 60.4 yards on five kickoffs.

Week of Sept. 29-Oct. 5: Offense - Randall Eldridge, Western Washington (RB, 5-10, 200, Jr., Lynnwood, WA – Chabot JC) gained 131 yards, including 53 on 22 rushes and 78 on four receptions to lead the Vikings to a 24-13 win at Monmouth. Eldridge scored two touchdowns, catching a 56-yard pass from Adam Perry on WWU's first play from scrimmage and on a six-yard run in the third quarter to stake his team to a 24-7 lead. **Defense** - Guy Ricciardulli, Humboldt State (DB, 5-11, 200, So., San Diego, CA – San Diego Mesa) had two big takeaways in a seven-point Lumberjack victory. In the second quarter he intercepted a pass at the HSU 11 allowing the 'Jacks to go on an 88-yard drive and open up a 21-7 halftime lead. Late in the fourth quarter, he recovered a fumble at the HSU 30 to end a possible game-tying TD drive by the Cougars. He also had four unassisted tackles, including one for a one-yard loss and broke up a pass. Ricciardulli leads the GNAC in interceptions with five.

Week of Oct. 6-12: Offense - Mike Reilly, Central Washington (QB, 6-3, 212, Sr., Kalispell, MT – Flathead) and Adam Wells, Dixie State (RB, 5-9, 180, So., Kenmore, WA – Inglemoor). . Reilly had a career-best 429 yards of total offense and set a school-record for career touchdown passes in leading Central Washington to a 50-28 win over Western Washington before 12,258 fans at Seattle's Qwest Field. Reilly, who also set an all-time NCAA record for most consecutive games with a touchdown pass (41), completed 36 of 47 passes for 371 yards and four touchdowns and added another 58 yards on the ground. He also broke the GNAC record and extended his own school record for most consecutive passes without an interception to 184 before a fourth-quarter pass tipped off the hands of a receiver and was grabbed by the Vikings' C.J. Green. . Wells rushed for a GNAC season-best 186 yards on 21 carries to lead Dixie State to a 16-6 win over Humboldt State. He set up his team's first touchdown with a 22-yard run down to the eight-yard line, then scored the second on a 61-yard run. **Defense** - Caleb Singleton, Western Oregon (DB, 6-4, 205, So., Salem, OR – South Salem) led a ball-hawking Wolf defense that limited Southern Oregon to 169 yards in a 35-3 win. Singleton had two of WOU's five interceptions and was also credited with five tackles including half a sack.

Week of Oct. 13-19: Offense - Josh Riddell, Western Oregon (QB, 6-0, 205, Jr., Salem, OR – McKay & Mississippi State) completed 17 of 25 passes for 267 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Wolves to a 42-35 home win over Dixie State. It was his fifth 200-yard game this season and was also his second highest total of the five. "It was Josh's most consistent game of the season," said Wolves head coach Arne Ferguson. "He ran the offense well and didn't make mistakes." **Defense** - Matt Cox, Western Oregon (DE, 6-0, 260, Sr., Salem, OR – North Salem) had a career-high 10 tackles, including 3 ½ for losses of 24 yards. Among his TFLs were 2 ½ sacks for losses of 22 yards. In addition to recording his first career double-digit tackle game, Cox reached historic if not record-setting TFL milestones. He now has 53 career tackle for losses and 27 QB sacks. The GNAC TFL record is 50, however only 23 of Cox's have come as a member of the GNAC. His QB sack total is one short of the GNAC record. Officially, though he ranks eighth in GNAC history with 13 ½ sacks. **Special Teams** – Garret Rolsma, Central Washington (K-P, 6-0, 197, Jr., University Place, WA – Curtis) set a GNAC record for consecutive extra points made and stayed on pace to set GNAC records for single-season field goals, field goal percentage and kick scoring in a 34-14 win at Humboldt State. Rolsma has made 41 straight this season, breaking the old GNAC record of 40 set by NFL veteran Michael Koenen of Western Washington during the 2001 and 2002 seasons. Rolsma's streak is 44 counting his final three attempts last season. The NCAA Division II record is 70. Rolsma also made two of three field goals Saturday and is 12 of 16 on the season, ahead of Koenen's record for highest single season percentage of 70.7 (12 of 17) in 2004. His miss snapped a string of seven in a row, two short of the GNAC record. He needs just two more field goals and five more points to equal GNAC single-season records for field goals and kick scoring. He has also averaged 60.6 on kickoffs this season (including 13 touchbacks) helping CWU gain the top ranking in the conference in kickoff coverage (41.6).

Week of Oct. 20-26: Offense - Johnny Spevak, Central Washington (WR, 6-3, 200, Jr., Edgewood, WA – Puyallup) and Dexter Hill, Dixie State (QB, 6-1, 190, Sr., Pocatello, ID – Northern Iowa). . Spevak set a GNAC single-season record with his seventh 100-yard receiving game of the season. He caught 10 passes for 166 yards including touchdown receptions of one and 41 yards in the second quarter as CWU overcame an early 10-3 deficit in a 38-31 Homecoming win over Western Oregon. He also recovered an on-side kick with less than two minutes to go to help preserve the victory as the Wildcats clinched their fourth conference title since 2002. . Hill had 336 yards in total offense, including a GNAC QB season-high 95 rushing yards in a seven-point road win at Azusa Pacific. Hill, who completed 20 of 34 passes for 241 yards and one touchdown, ran 20 yards to set up one touchdown then later scored on a five-yard run as Dixie scored twice in the fourth quarter to overcome a seven-point deficit. **Defense** - Chris James, Central Washington (LB, 5-11, 210, Sr., Tacoma, WA – Bellarmine Prep) had 12 tackles and helped thwart two Western Oregon touchdown drives in a seven-point win. In the first quarter, he forced a fumble on a first-and-goal at CWU's 7-yard line. The fumble was recovered by CWU linebacker Buddy Wood who equaled a GNAC single-season record with his fourth recovery. Then in the second quarter James was credited with a QB hurry on a second-and-four pass from the CWU 18 that was intercepted by Courtney Smith. He also had a tackle for a three-yard loss. **Special Teams** - Courtney Smith, Central Washington (DB, 5-11, 200, Sr., Stockton, CA – Langston) and Rick Copsey, Western Washington (WR, 5-8, Jr., Camas, WA) . . Smith set one GNAC record and tied two others. His 98-yard fourth-quarter kickoff return, which turned out to be the winning score, was the longest kick return in GNAC history. He also tied GNAC season and career records for kickoff return touchdowns (2). He also had three tackles and a key interception on a second-and-four play from CWU's 18 in the second period. . Copsey helped set up three first-half Western Washington touchdowns with long kick returns. He had a 42 and 61 returns to set up scores that put WWU ahead

21-6 and 28-13, respectively, in the first half. He also had a 41-yard punt return to set up the score that enabled the Vikings to stretch their lead to 35-13 late in the second quarter. In all, he had 164 yards on four returns, including 123 on three kickoffs.

Week of Oct. 27-Nov. 2: Offense - Josh Riddell, Western Oregon (QB, 6-0, 205, Jr., Salem, OR – McKay/Mississippi State) completed 26 of 43 passes for 488 yards and four touchdowns leading the Wolves to a 34-10 home win against Humboldt State. Riddell set school and GNAC records for passing yards. He toppled the 1994 school mark of 420 yards set by Brian Traeger against Southern Oregon and broke the GNAC record of 468 set by Jason Baughman of Humboldt State against Southern Oregon in 2003. He also tied the GNAC total offense record of 493 set by HSU's Chris Dixon against Sacramento State in 2001. His touchdown passes went to four different receivers – eight yards to Demario Ballard in the first quarter, 32 yards to Isaiah Smith and 19 yards to Shaun Kauleinamoku in the second quarter and 27 yards to Devin Stearns in the third quarter. **Defense** - Kevin Jones, Western Washington (CB, 5-9, 175, Sr., Seattle, WA – Kentwood/C. of Siskiyou) had seven tackles, including a game-high six solos, and also forced and recovered a fumble and returned an interception 26 yards. His fumble recovery at the Dixie 31 set up a 47-yard field goal by Josh Lider to give WWU a 12-7 lead midway through the second quarter. His interception came at the WWU 42. He returned it to the Dixie 32 and it indirectly, after an exchange of possessions, put WWU in position to post a safety.

Week of Nov. 3-9: Offense - Justin Helwege, Central Washington (WR, 6-4, 205, Fr., Sammamish, WA – Eastlake) and Dexter Hill, Dixie State (QB, 6-1, 190, Sr., Pocatello, ID – Highland) . . . Helwege had three game-changing receptions for 108 yards as the Wildcats wrapped up a NCAA post-season berth with a 49-21 win over Western Washington. In the second quarter with CWU protecting a 14-6 lead and facing a third-and-20 from its own 10-yard line, Helwege caught a 46-yard pass from quarterback Mike Reilly to key a nine-play, 80-yard TD drive. In the third quarter, his 37-yard catch took the ball to the three-yard line where Jerome Morris scored to put the Wildcats up 35-14. Then in the fourth quarter, he had a 25-yard reception to set up a two-yard run by Morris for another touchdown. . . Hill, a transfer from Northern Iowa, had 405 yards of total offense leading Dixie to a 19-15 win at Humboldt State. He threw for 336 yards, completing 31 of 59 passes, including a seven-yard game-winning TD pass to Kyser Christensen with one second remaining. He also rushed for 69 yards on 14 carries. **Defense** - Bubba Reynolds, Humboldt State (LB, 5-11, 218, Jr. Huntington Beach, CA – Orange Coast CC) had perhaps the most impressive statistical defensive game in GNAC history in a last-second loss to Dixie State. Reynolds set a GNAC single-game record for tackles (25) and tied the conference record for assisted tackles (16). He also had 2 ½ tackles for losses of seven yards, forced a fumble, intercepted a pass and also had a breakup. **Special Teams** – Courtney Smith, Central Washington (DB, 5-11, 200, Sr., Stockton, CA – East Union) returned the opening kickoff 84 yards to set up a touchdown enabling the Wildcats to take a lead they never relinquished. Western Washington kicked away from Smith, who is averaging 42.1 yards on 10 returns, the rest of the afternoon. Four of his 10 returns this fall have been for 45 or more yards (98, 95, 84 and 45), two of them for touchdowns.

2009

Week of Aug. 24-30: Offense - Judd Thompson, Dixie State (QB, 6-3, 220, Sr., Crystal Lake, Ill. – Prairie Ridge) set a school record (since transitioning from the JC ranks) for passing yards completing 27 of 40 for 374 yards and four touchdowns in a 37-28 win over Adams State. Thompson, who had 382 yards in total offense, tossed TD passes of 55 and six yards to Kyser Christensen, 22 yards to Skyler Ence and 10 yards to Nash Fowler. **Defense** – Buddy Wood, Central Washington (LB, 6-3, 214, Sr., Chattaroy,

WA – Riverside) was credited with 10 tackles and also had takeaways on Mesa State's only two journeys inside the CWU 40-yard line as the Wildcats posted their first shutout in nearly two years. Wood ended one Mesa drive with a fumble recovery at CWU's 16 and another with an interception at the Wildcat 24. **Special Teams** – Garrett Rolsma, Central Washington (K/P, 6-1, 200, Sr., University Place, WA – Curtis) averaged 40.6 yards on five punts and 67.7 yards on three kickoffs and did not allow a return on either. He also had a 30-yard field goal to extend a 7-0 lead to 10-0 in the fourth quarter after earlier extending his own streak of consecutive PATs to 67.

Week of Aug. 31-Sept. 6: Offense - Mike Proulx, Humboldt State (QB, 5-11, 200, So., Castro Valley, CA) completed 20 of 29 passes for 336 yards and four touchdowns leading the 'Jacks to a 36-24 win over Adams State in their season opener. Proulx threw for 904 yards during the entire 2008 season. **Defense** – Prince Hall, Central Washington (LB, 6-0, 264, Sr., Moreno Valley, CA) had seven tackles, including two for losses to help key a Wildcat defense that held defending national champion Minnesota Duluth to a single field goal after the opening quarter in a 13-10 victory. Hall made two key defensive stops on perhaps the biggest defensive series of the game, holding UMD to a two-yard gain and then a two-yard loss on second and third down plays inside the CWU 10. That forced a 23-yard field goal try late in the third quarter which was blocked by Eugene Germany, keeping the game tied at that point 10-10. **Special Teams** – Jon Dowd, Western Oregon (WR, 5-11, 205, Sr., Corvallis, WA – Crescent Valley) had 203 all-purpose yards including 163 on five kickoff returns and 40 on five receptions. His 58-yard return on the opening kickoff led to good field position as the Wolves battled Eastern Washington on even terms during the first half.

Week of Sept. 7-13: Offense - Ryan Robertson, Central Washington (QB, 6-3, 195, Fr., Sammamish, WA – Eastlake) had an extraordinary first half in leading the Wildcats to a 34-10 win over West Texas A&M in their 2009 home opener. Robertson completed 18 of 24 passes for 227 yards and four touchdowns in the first two quarters as CWU jumped to a 31-3 lead on the way to a 34-10 victory. The redshirt freshman finished the afternoon with 256 yards, completing 21 of 36. Ten months ago, West Texas knocked CWU out of the NCAA Division II playoffs with a 49-42 win at Canyon, Tex. **Defense** – Keauntea Bankhead, Dixie State (LB, 6-1, 255, Jr., Seattle, WA – Arizona Western) led a Red Storm defense that limited Big Sky member Montana State to just two touchdowns, MSU's Jason Cunningham kicked three field goals enabling the Bobcats to escape with a 23-20 home victory. Bankhead had 13 tackles, including six solos, recovered a fumble and also broke two passes. **Special Teams** – Kyle Schierholt, Humboldt State (K, 5-10, 200 Sr., Chugiak, AK – Northern State) kicked three field goals, including one from 46 yards early in the fourth quarter in a 17-16 loss to Western Oregon. Schierholt also converted from 36 and 34 yards. The game was the conference opener for both schools.

Week of Sept. 14-20: Offense - Sean Fullerton, Western Oregon (WR, 6-2, 210, Sr., West Linn, OR) caught 14 passes for 164 yards, including receptions of 20, nine, 16 and 12 yards to set up a game-winning 46-yard field goal by Kelly Morgan with 3:39 left as the Wolves rallied for a 17-16 home win against Dixie State. Fullerton fell one reception short of the GNAC single-game record of 15 held jointly by Dustin Creager of Humboldt State and Central Washington's Brian Potucek. Creager had 15 receptions against Western Oregon in 2004 and Potucek equaled the record a year later against Nebraska Omaha. **Defense** – Nick Cragin, Dixie State (LB, 5-10, 205, Sr., Issaquah, WA – Skyline) put the Red Storm in position to earn a road win before Western Oregon's game-winning drive. Cragin, a transfer from Western Washington, had a game-high 11 tackles and also had a 53-yard interception return for a touchdown in the second quarter as Dixie opened up a 16-7 lead. Cragin is tied with Central Washington linebacker Buddy Wood for the GNAC lead in tackles with 40 and ranks third in tackles

for losses with four. **Special Teams** – Sitani Tupou, Western Oregon (DT, 6-3, 295, Jr., Sacramento, CA – Cordova & Sierra JC) had two game-changing plays, one on special teams and one on defense. He blocked an extra point try by Dixie in the second quarter that ultimately led to the one-point victory. Then on the final play of the game, he had a 10-yard quarterback sack to secure the victory. He had two other tackles and also broke up a pass.

Week of Sept. 21-27: Offense - Adam Wells, Dixie State (RB, 5-9, 203, Jr., Kenmore, WA – Inglemoor) had 124 all-purpose yards and scored two touchdowns to lead the Red Storm to a fourth-quarter comeback win over Humboldt State. Wells rushed for 38 yards on seven carries and also caught five passes for 86 yards, including touchdown receptions of 13 yards in the opening quarter and five yards in the fourth quarter. He also had a 42-yard reception to set up a 39-yard field goal by Mike Langston late in the third quarter as Dixie overcame a 17-7 deficit to win 24-20. **Defense** – Buddy Wood, Central Washington (LB, 6-3, 214, Sr., Chattaroy, WA – Riverside) and Wesley Beavers, Dixie State (S, 6-1, 210, Sr., Las Vegas, NV). . Wood led a Central defense which limited Idaho State to minus 33 yards rushing and 215 in total offense in a 33-22 win. He had five tackles, including 2 ½ for losses totaling 30 yards. Wood also forced and recovered fumbles and earned his third career fumble recovery touchdown, two of them in the past two weeks. The Bengals had just 10 first downs against the CWU defense and had only 148 yards in total offense prior to a 67-yard touchdown pass on their final offensive snap of the contest. . Beavers had a pair of fourth-quarter interceptions as Dixie State rallied for a four-point win over Humboldt State. He returned the first interception 34 yards to the seven-yard line to set up a game-winning one-yard touchdown run by Tauni Vakapuna with 7:24 left in the fourth quarter. Later he sealed the victory with an interception at the seven, enabling Dixie to run the final 1:26 off the clock. **Special Teams** – Kyle Schierholt, Humboldt State (K, 5-10, 200, Sr., Chugiak, AK – Northern State) kicked field goals of 23 and 46 yards to stake the 'Jacks to a 20-10 fourth-quarter lead. He also averaged 67.6 yards on five kickoffs without allowing a kick return yard and 40.0 yards on three punts, including a net 34.7. Schierholt is six of seven on field goals this fall, including a GNAC-best two of three from beyond 40 yards. His only field goal miss came from 50 and it was blocked.

Week of Sept. 28-Oct. 4: Offense - Johnny Spevak, Central Washington (WR, 6-3, 200, Sr., Edgewood, WA – Puyallup) caught eight passes for 71 yards and a pair of touchdowns leading the Wildcats to 37-6 conference home win over Dixie State. Spevak recorded his 50 th and 51 st career touchdown receptions with catches of five and 14 yards in the second and third quarters, respectively, increasing his career point total to 308. In the process he tied a CWU school record for career pass receptions and set the school record for career pass receiving yards increasing his totals to 283 and 3,907, respectively. Brian Potucek had 283 receptions for 3,889 yards for CWU between 2001 and 2004. Both receivers wore uniform number 84 in their careers and coincidentally have now combined for 84 career TD receptions. **Defense** – Adam Bighill, Central Washington (LB, 5-10, 218, Jr., Montesano, WA) led the Wildcats in tackles for the second week in a row making 11 stops, including 2 ½ for losses totaling 17 yards. He also had an interception. A year ago, Bighill was CWU's No. 2 tackler with 78 and tied for the team lead in interceptions with five. He missed Central's first four games this season, but in the last two contests has had 20 tackles (4 ½ for losses) and has helped lead a defense that has allowed just 389 yards, including minus 62 rushing. **Special Teams** – Jon Dowd, Western Oregon (WR, 5-11, 205, Sr., Corvallis, OR – Crescent Valley) had 139 all-purpose yards, including 102 on five punt returns, 14 on one kick return and 23 on two receptions. He scored WOU's first touchdown in a 23-0 win over Southern Oregon on a 49-yard punt return in the first quarter, then set up the first of three Wolf field goals recovering a fumble at the seven-yard line on a

Southern Oregon punt return in the second quarter. Dowd leads the GNAC this fall in both punt returns (15.8) and kickoff returns (27.2). His punt return average is on pace to break the GNAC single-season record of 15.0 set by Greg Dykstra of Western Washington in 2002.

Week of Oct. 5-11: Offense - Randall Eldridge, Central Washington (RB, 5-9, 192, Sr., Lynnwood, WA) had 162 all-purpose yards and scored all three of his team's offensive touchdowns in a 34-27 win against Humboldt State. He carried the ball 30 times for 111 yards, including nine straight times for 34 yards on CWU's final TD drive in the fourth quarter. He also led the Wildcats in receiving with five catches for 51 yards. With Eldridge doing most of the work, Central controlled the football for all but 3 ½ minutes of the final quarter. Eldridge, who was the GNAC rushing leader a year ago when he netted 805 yards for Western Washington, leads the conference in rushing with 520 yards. **Defense** – Ross Doman, Dixie State (S, 5-11, 190, Sr., Woodburn, OR - Canby) had a pair of interceptions, including one in the end zone in the fourth quarter enabling the Red Storm to protect a 14-point lead on the way to an eight-point victory. His first interception came in the second quarter in Dixie territory. He returned that one 41 yards to the WOU 19. Doman also had four tackles and broke up a pair of passes. **Special Teams** – Mike Langston, Dixie State (K-P, 6-2, 200, Jr., Riverside, CA – Ramona) punted for a GNAC season-best average of 46.7 and did not allow a return yard in the Red Storm's 31-23 win over Western Oregon. His average was the best by a punter in the GNAC since Coby Sadler of Central Washington set the conference record with a 50.8 average in 2004. Langston, who has the three best punting averages this fall in the conference, also kicked a 40-yard field goal.

Week of Oct. 12-18: Offense - Corey Stollmeyer, Humboldt State (6-0, 190, Sr., Morro Bay, CA), playing his first game at running back, ran for 129 yards and three touchdowns to lead the Lumberjacks to a 34-3 win over Southern Oregon. Stollmeyer, who moved from his normal slot back position because of injuries to two HSU running backs, finished with 153 all-purpose yards and scored on runs of 14, 10 and three yards as the 'Jacks improved to 4-3. Stollmeyer leads the GNAC in all-purpose running with 764 yards, including 202 rushing, 316 receiving and 246 on kick returns. **Defense** – Jerome Williams, Central Washington (DB, 6-0, 205, Sr., Seattle, WA – Ballard), had a GNAC-record 100-yard interception return as the Wildcats overcame a 21-0 halftime deficit to beat Western Oregon 23-21 and remain unbeaten. The interception was the 13 th of his career. Williams finished with 146 all-purpose yards including 10 on two punt returns and 36 on one kickoff return. He also had five tackles and broke up a pass. **Special Teams** – Garrett Rolsma, Central Washington (6-1, 200, Sr., University Place, WA – Curtis) made three field goals, including the game-winner from 44 yards with 32 seconds remaining. Rolsma also converted from 32 yards in the third quarter and from 22 midway through the fourth stanza.

Week of Oct. 19-25: Offense - Cole Morgan, Central Washington (QB, 6-3, 203, Sr., Seattle, WA – Ballard), making his first-career start, had 213 yards in total offense in leading the Wildcats to a 38-7 win over Humboldt State. Almost all of Morgan's yardage came in the first half when Central piled up 298 yards of offense and built a 31-0 lead. The fifth-year senior, who came off the bench to rally CWU from a 21-0 halftime deficit in a 23-21 a week earlier against Western Oregon, completed 13 of 19 passes for 161 yards and two touchdowns in the opening half. He finished with 182 yards on 14 completions in 27 attempts and also netted 31 yards on four rushes. **Defense** – John Breza, Western Oregon (LB, 6-1, 250, Sr., Salem, OR – Sprague & Foothill JC) had a game-high 11 tackles, including a GNAC season-high 3 ½ tackles for losses of eight yards as the Wolves held Azusa Pacific without a touchdown and to 29 second-half yards in a 27-6 road victory. Breza currently ranks sixth in the conference in tackles with 60. **Special Teams** – Garrett Rolsma, Central Washington (K/P, 6-1, 200, Sr.,

University Place, WA – Curtis) had career longs for field goal made (47) and punt (65) and also tied his own GNAC single-season record with his 15 th of the season. He averaged 42.5 yards his four punts and did not allow a return yard. Rolsma now ranks third on the CWU career scoring list with 306 points. He is 15 of 18 on three-pointers after making 15 of 20 last season. Rolsma also made five extra points extending his record-streak to 97.

Week of Oct. 26-Nov. 1: Offense - Josh Riddell, Western Oregon (QB, 6-1, 205, Sr., Salem, OR - McKay) completed 25 of 40 passes for 324 yards and three touchdowns leading the Wolves to a 31-28 win over Humboldt State. Riddell had six completions on a 12-play, 68-yard touchdown drive in the fourth quarter as WOU got the winning score on a five-yard run by D.J. Jackson. Riddell, who started his career at Mississippi State, became the sixth quarterback in GNAC history to surpass the 5,000-yard career mark in both passing and total offense, finishing the day with 5,070 and 5,182 yards, respectively. **Defense** – Caleb Singleton, Western Oregon (DB, 6-4, 210, Jr., Salem, OR – West Salem) had a GNAC season-high 16 tackles, including 10 solos, and also had a 60-yard interception return in the second quarter in the Wolves' three-point win. His interception on a second-and-goal play from the WOU 5 not only prevented a Humboldt State touchdown but set up a Riddell's 30-yard TD toss to Tirrell Thompson that gave WOU a 21-7 lead. **Special Teams** – Jerome Williams, Central Washington (DB, 6-0, 205, Sr., Seattle, WA – Ballard) had 130 return yards, including a 72-yard kickoff return to start the third quarter and set up CWU's only touchdown of the second half in a 23-9 win at Dixie State. Williams had 93 yards on two kickoff returns and 37 on four punt returns. He also had four tackles and three pass breaks.

Week of Nov. 2-8: Offense - Mike Proulx, Humboldt State (QB, 5-11, 200, So., Castro Valley, CA) threw for 299 yards and four touchdowns and was not intercepted in leading the Lumberjacks to a 33-23 home win over Dixie State. Proulx completed 26 of 42 passes and also rushed for 20 yards as HSU snapped a 17-game conference-game losing streak. **Defense** – Buddy Wood, Central Washington (LB, 6-3, 214, Sr., Chattaroy, WA – Riverside) had 14 tackles, including 3 ½ for losses of six yards, to lead a Wildcat defense that limited Western Oregon to 167 yards and nine first downs, none of them on the ground where WOU netted only 31 yards. Wood has had 361 career tackles, more than anyone in GNAC history. This season he ranks fourth in the conference in tackles with 87 and is the GNAC leader in tackles for loss with 15 ½. **Special Teams** – Kyle Schierholt, Humboldt State (K-P, 5-10, 200, Sr., Chugiak, AK) kicked fourth-quarter field goals of 33 and 19 yards to give the Lumberjacks a 10-point cushion and also averaged 42.8 yards on five punts in a 33-23 victory.

Week of Aug. 30-Sept. 5: Offense - AJ Robinson, Western Oregon (QB, 6-0, 200, Sr., Redmond, OR), who had thrown only three passes in three previous seasons, completed 14 of 29 for 261 yards and three first-half touchdowns to lead the Wolves to a 38-0 shutout of Simon Fraser. He threw a 49-yard TD pass to Justin Ore on WOU's first possession of the game and also combined with Trevor Gates for two second-period scores of five and 46 yards as the Wolves built a 28-0 halftime lead. **Defense** – Jared Silva-Purcell, Central Washington (LB, 5-10, 225, Sr., Honolulu, HI – St. Louis), a transfer from University of Nevada, had a 15-yard interception for a touchdown to put the Wildcats ahead 17-7 in the second quarter on the way to a 24-14 win at Hansen Stadium in Saint George, Utah. Purcell also was CWU's second-leading tackler with six stops. On the season, he ranks 11 th in the conference with 13 tackles. **Special Teams** – Scott Buche, Western Oregon (6-5, 200, Jr., Myrtle Point, OR) averaged a net 49 yards on six punts and on four different occasions forced Simon Fraser to begin a drive inside their own 10-yard line. Simon Fraser's starting point following Buche's

punts were the 23, 20, 2, 8, 8 and 4-yard lines. Last year, Buche, who didn't allow a return yard Saturday, averaged just 35.4 yards on 59 punts.

Week of Sept. 6-12: Offense - Lynden Rowells, Humboldt State (RB, 5-10, 200, Jr., Largo, FL – College of the Redwood) had 233 all-purpose yards, rushing for 168 on 17 carries, catching three passes for 25 yards and returning a kickoff 40 yards, in leading the Lumberjacks to a 49-14 road win at Dixie State. Rowells keyed a 42-point first half scoring on an 80-yard run midway through the first quarter and later scoring on a 13-yard run in the second quarter to finish off a 14-play, 80-yard drive. **Defense** – Paul Wright, Central Washington (LB, 5-11, 210, Sr., Martinez, CA – Illinois State) had 13 tackles, including 2 ½ for losses of three yards as he led a CWU defense that held the Division 1 Football Championship Subdivision team to just 311 yards in a 35-32 loss. **Special Teams** – Tim McMullen, Humboldt State (6-3, 217, Fr., Parkdale, Australia) averaged 42.8 yards on six punts, including a long of 53. Of his six punts, three landed inside the 20 and another was a touchback.

Week of Sept. 13-19: Offense - Darryl Valdez, Western Oregon (RB, 5-11, 195, Sr., San Francisco, CA – Central Catholic & Illinois State) had 201 of Western Oregon's school-record 684 yards from scrimmage as the Wolves improved to 2-0 in the GNAC with a 48-25 home win against Simon Fraser. Valdez rushed for 77 yards on 19 carries and also caught five passes for 124 yards. The Wolves finished the contest with 275 yards rushing and 409 passing, falling just 12 shy of the GNAC single-game record of 696 set by Central Washington against Fort Lewis in 2002. **Defense** – Justin Hornsby, Humboldt State (DE, 6-3, 238, Sr., Jamul, CA – Southwestern College) led a Lumberjack defense that didn't allow a point until the fourth quarter and surrendered only 166 yards, 84 of them in the final stanza. Hornsby was credited with team highs for total tackles (8) and solo tackles (5). He had one tackle for loss and split a quarterback sack. **Special Teams** – Sean Davis, Central Washington (K, 5-11, 180, So., Federal Way, WA – Todd Beamer) kicked field goals of 43 and 46 yards in the Wildcats' home win over Dixie State. Davis is perfect in three attempts this fall, including a 50-yarder the previous week against Eastern Washington. That three-pointer was the longest by a CWU kicker in 18 years.

Week of Sept. 20-26: Offense - Bryson Kelly, Central Washington (RB, 6-2, 235, Sr., Mukilteo, WA – Kamiak & Santa Ana) and Gabriel Ephard, Simon Fraser (RB, 5-10, 200, Sr., North Vancouver, BC – Windsor & Minot State). . Kelly and Ephard had two of the most prolific single-game rushing performances in GNAC history running for 246 and 222 yards, respectively, in CWU's 43-30 win at Terry Fox Field. Both had GNAC record-setting performances. Kelly, who averaged 8.2 yards on 30 carries, tied the conference single game record for rushing touchdowns scoring four times on runs of 1, 22, 4 and 3 yards. He is the third back in GNAC history to accomplish that feat. Ephard averaged 15.9 yards, netting 222 yards on 14 carries including touchdown runs of 64 and 70 yards. He broke the old GNAC record for most yards per carry (min. 10 attempts) of 10.2 set by DJ Jackson of Western Oregon against Western Washington in 2008. Kelly and Ephard are only the third and fourth running backs in GNAC history to rush for 200 yards in a single game, joining CWU's Nat Conley who had 322 yards against Humboldt State in 2001 and the Wildcats' Emilio Iniguez who had 219 against Montana Western in 2004. Ephard is the only one of the four to accomplish that feat without carrying the ball at least 30 times. **Defense** – Michael Lynch, Humboldt State (LB, 5-10, 225, Sr., Sacramento, CA - UNLV) led the Lumberjack defense with nine tackles, including seven solos. Among his stops were two for losses of four yards. While the loss of yardage wasn't big, both plays were. His third-down sack of Evan Mozzochi in the first quarter forced a field goal attempt by Kelly Morgan, which was blocked by Jonathan Faraimo and subsequently scooped up and run back 59 yards for a touchdown by DB Jordan McGowan-Smith. His other tackle

for loss came late in the third quarter on a fourth-and-two play enabling the 'Jacks to take over possession of the ball on their own 28 and ending a WOU scoring threat. **Special Teams** – Sean Davis, Central Washington (5-11, 180, So., Federal Way, WA – Todd Beamer) scored 14 points, converting on all three of his field goal attempts from 26, 35 and 28 yards and all five of his extra points. Davis is a perfect six-of-six on the season on field goals and five of five on extra points.

Week of Sept. 27-Oct. 3: Offense - Mike Proulx, Humboldt State (QB, 5-11, 203, Jr., Castro Valley, CA) and Jesse Ence, Dixie State (RB, 5-9, 200, Jr., Saint George, UT – Pine View). . .Proulx had 250 yards in total offense in leading the Lumberjacks to a 25-24 win over Central Washington. The junior QB completed 20 of 34 passes for 197 yards, including a 32-yard toss to Patrick Gondkoff on a critical fourth-and-five play from CWU's 42 to set up a game-winning 18-yard field by Brian Blumberg. Proulx, who had one touchdown pass, also rushed for 53 yards on eight carries. He set up a four-yard touchdown run by Lyndon Rowells late in the second period with a 35-yard run to give Humboldt a 13-10 lead at the break. . . Ence rushed for 150 yards on 25 carries to lead Dixie State to a 28-21 win at Simon Fraser. Ence gave the Red Storm the lead for good, scoring from 11 yards to break a 14-14 tie in the third quarter. He then secured the win in the fourth period, with a 23-yard run enabling Dixie to run out the remainder of the clock. **Defense** – Jonathan Faraimo, Humboldt State (LB, 5-11, 240, Jr., Sacramento, CA – U. of Idaho) had nine tackles, including 1 ½ for losses of three yards. Faraimo's biggest tackle came on a third-and-one play from CWU's 45 on which he stopped running back Bryson Kelly for a two-yard loss giving the 'Jacks an opportunity to win the game with a field goal. **Special Teams** – Brian Blumberg, Humboldt State (K, 5-6, 166, Jr., Redondo Beach, CA – U. of Hawaii) kicked two crucial field goals. He first made a 30-yarder with 52 seconds left in the third quarter to pull HSU to within one-point at 17-16. He then made an 18-yarder with 1:12 remaining in the fourth quarter to finish off an eight-play, 60-yard drive. Those were his first two attempts of the season.

Week of Oct. 4-10: Offense - Bo Palmer, Simon Fraser (RB, 5-9, 185, So., North Vancouver, BC – Windsor) came off the bench to rush for 128 yards and one touchdown as the Clan beat UBC 27-20 in the Shrum Bowl, earning its first victory of the season. Palmer scored on a one-yard run in the first quarter and later ran 60 yards to set a third-quarter field goal giving SFU a 27-13 lead. **Defense** – Caleb Singleton, Western Oregon (DB, 6-4, 215, Sr., Salem, OR – West Salem) had a pair of fourth-quarter interceptions to seal a 40-27 win for the Wolves at St. George, Utah. His first theft came in the end zone and his second came with 1:10 remaining enabling WOU to run out the clock. He also had a team-high nine tackles, a blocked pass and a blocked PAT. On the season, Singleton leads the GNAC with five interceptions and ranks 12th in tackles with 39. **Special Teams** – Jordan McGowan-Smith, Humboldt State (DB, 6-0, 175, Jr., Santa Rosa, CA) returned a punt 87 yards for a touchdown to give the Lumberjacks a 28-17 lead early in the third quarter on the way to a 49-32 victory. McGowan-Smith also had five tackles, including four solos. His return was the third longest in GNAC history.

Week of Oct. 11-17: Offense - Lyndon Rowells, Humboldt State (RB, 5-10, 200, Jr., Largo, FL – College of the Redwoods) earned his fifth 100-yard rushing game of the season netting 107 yards on 17 carries as the Lumberjacks defeated Dixie State 28-3. It was the 15th 100-yard game of the season in the GNAC, including the sixth by a HSU running back. **Defense** – Adam Bighill, Central Washington (LB, 5-10, 222, Sr., Montesano, WA) had 12 tackles, including five for losses of 18 yards. He led a Wildcat defense that limited Western Oregon, which came in averaging 410 yards per game, to 98 yards and earned its second consecutive shutout. Nine of Bighill's tackles were solos and three were

sacks for losses of 14. He also forced a fumble. **Special Teams** – Patrick Gondkoff, Humboldt State (WR, 6-0, 183, So., Pleasanton, CA – Amador Valley) returned two kickoffs 97 yards, including one 83 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter. Gondkoff also caught two passes for a net 57 yards. One was a 66-yard touchdown catch; the other was for a nine-yard loss. His 154 all-purpose yards was a game-best.

Week of Oct. 18-24: Offense - Greg Bowcott, Simon Fraser (QB, 6-4, 216, Fr., Abbotsford, BC – Rick Hansen) had a remarkable collegiate debut, directing a Clan offense that gained 504 yards, 162 more than its season average prior to the game. Bowcott completed 16 of 36 passes for 233 yards and also ran for a touchdown. With just 1:06 remaining, he led SFU from its own 20 to Dixie State's 19 completing passes of 23, 30 and 13 yards before the time remaining forced a field goal try on second down. The three-point try was blocked by Dixie's Danny Hawkins to end the storybook finish for the freshman. **Defense** – Caleb Singleton, Western Oregon (DB, 6-4, 215, Sr., Salem, OR – West Salem) had 16 tackles, one shy of the conference-season best of 17, to lead the Wolves to a 38-17 win over Azusa Pacific. Among his tackles was one for a one-yard loss. He also had his league-leading sixth interception of the season with 2:10 remaining to set up the clinching touchdown. **Special Teams** – Lucas Gonsalves, Western Oregon (WR, 5-9, 175, Fr., Kailua, HI – St. Louis) and Dominique Gaisie, Central Washington (DB, 5-9, 160, Jr., West Covina, CA – Bishop Amat & Utah State) had two of the three highest return yardage performances in GNAC history. Gonsalves had 210 yards, including 98 on five punts and 112 on two kickoffs to break the GNAC record of 208 set by WOU's Tyler Knudsen against Linfield in 2004. Gaisie had 188 return yards, including a GNAC season-high 108 in seven punts and 80 on three kickoffs. His total now ranks third in GNAC history.

Week of Oct. 25-Nov. 1: Offense - Lyndon Rowells, Humboldt State (RB, 5-10, 200, Jr., Largo, Fla. – College of the Redwoods) rushed for 212 yards, including touchdown runs of 8, 23 and 34 to lead the Lumberjacks to a 35-14 road win at Simon Fraser. Rowells increased his season rushing total to 1,017 yards, making him only the third running back in Humboldt school history to surpass the 1,000-yard barrier and the first since John Burman rushed for 1,233 in 1968. He is only the fifth back in GNAC history to net 200 or more yards in a single game. Three of those occurrences have been this season. **Defense** – Bryce Peila, Western Oregon (DB, 6-1, 200, So., Central Point, OR – Crater) returned an interception 22 yards for a touchdown to give the Wolves a 14-0 lead in the first quarter and also blocked a punt, broke up a pass and had two tackles to spark a defense that allowed just 155 yards. Peila now has five interceptions on the season, returning two for touchdowns in back-to-back weeks. **Special Teams** – None selected.

Week of Nov. 1-7: Offense - Ryan Robertson, Central Washington (QB, 6-3, 200, So., Sammamish, WA - Eastlake) completed 12 of 16 passes for 211 yards and one touchdown in leading the Wildcats to a 34-7 win against Simon Fraser. It was his fourth 200-yard game of the season, tying him for the conference lead with A.J. Robinson of Western Oregon. Robertson has thrown for 1,904 yards and 13 touchdowns this season and ranks first in the GNAC in passing yards. He is second in passing efficiency (130.4). He increased his career passing total to 3,179 yards and is the seventh QB in CWU history and the 15th in GNAC history to throw for 3,000 or more yards. **Defense** – Stan Langlow, Central Washington (DB, 6-3, 200, Fr., University Place, WA - Curtis) intercepted three passes to equal the GNAC single-game record set by Duval Seamster of Humboldt State against Saint Mary's in 2003 and equaled twice by Western Oregon's Bret Hughes against Western Washington in 2004 and 2005. Langlow, who had 75 return yards, is the first CWU player to pick off three in a game since Bill Morrison accomplished that feat against San Francisco State on Nov. 7, 1970. Two of

Langlow's three thefts set up scores. He had an eight-yard return prior to a 22-yard Sean Davis field goal in the second quarter. He also had a 48-yard interception return in the third quarter that, following a penalty, led to a 52-yard passing touchdown from Robertson to Chris Smith as CWU extended its lead to 24-0. Langlow, who leads the GNAC with seven interceptions, also had five tackles. **Special Teams** – Kelly Morgan, Western Oregon (K, 5-9, 170, So., Sherwood, OR) tied a GNAC record by kicking four field goals, including a 25-yarder with 2:55 left as the Wolves beat Humboldt State 26-24 to keep alive their GNAC title hopes. Morgan also connected on field goals of 26, 25 and 30 yards to tie the record set by Michael Koenen of Western Washington against Western Oregon in 2001 and equaled by Dixie State's Mike Langston against Azusa Pacific last year. All three kickers were perfect in their record-setting games making four of four. Morgan also averaged 60 yards of five kickoffs, one of which was a touchback.

Week of Nov. 8-14: Offense - Lyndon Rowells, Humboldt State (RB, 5-10, 200, Jr., Largo, Fla. – College of the Redwoods) rushed for 210 yards and a GNAC-record five touchdowns as the Lumberjacks scored 66 points, the most ever in a conference game. Rowells scored on runs of 22 and 30 yards in the first quarter, 14 in the second quarter and two and 71 in the third quarter in setting a school single-season record for rushing yardage. His 15 rushing touchdowns on the season was three off the GNAC single-season record of 18 set by Willie Johnson of Central Washington in 2002 and his rushing total was just 18 shy of the GNAC record of 1,327 set by CWU's Nat Conley in 2001. Rowells did break Conley's GNAC record for yards per rush of 5.7, averaging 6.2 on 210 carries. **Defense** – Dominique Gaisie, Central Washington (DB, 5-9, 160, Jr., West Covina, CA – Utah State) and Caleb Singleton, Western Oregon (DB, 6-4, 215, Sr., Salem, OR – West Salem) – Gaisie had an interception, a fumble recovery and also forced a fumble in CWU's win. He also broke up a pass, had four tackles and a total of 119 returns yards - 89 on four kickoffs, 21 on two punts and nine on one interception. His 44-yard kick return to begin the second half set up CWU's final touchdown in a five-point win. Singleton had 17 total tackles, including seven solos and two for losses of four yards. He also blocked a field goal and an extra point, costing the Wildcats a potential four points. **Special Teams** – Lucas Gonsalves, Western Oregon (WR, 5-9, 175, Fr., Kaihua, HI – St. Louis) had 128 return yards, including a 64-yard punt return to set up a fourth-quarter touchdown for the Wolves. Gonsalves finished the season as the GNAC leader in punt returns, averaging 13.3 yards per return and finished second in kickoff returns, averaging 24.6.

2011

Week of Aug. 29-Sept. 4: Offense – Mike Proulx, Humboldt State (QB, 5-11, 203, Sr., Castro Valley, CA) and Bo Palmer, Simon Fraser (RB, 5-9, 185, Jr., North Vancouver, BC – Windsor) – Proulx threw for 366 yards – the second-highest total in his career – to lead the Lumberjacks to a 29-3 win over Colorado Mesa. Proulx, who had 376 yards in total offense, completed 21 of 35 passes and wasn't intercepted, while throwing a pair of short touchdown passes. Palmer netted 181 yards on 15 rushes, scoring on runs of 23 yards in the first quarter and 72 yards in the second period. His latter score put the Clan up 23-21 on the way to a 36-28 victory. Palmer also caught three passes for 11 yards. **Defense** – Cache Morgan, Dixie State (DB, 5-11, 190 Jr., West Jordan, UT – Utah State) had a game-high 17 tackles, including nine solos. One of his tackles was for a 16-yard loss. He also returned a kickoff a GNAC-record 100 yards for the Red Storm's first touchdown. Later he forced a fumble, which was recovered by DSC's Blake Hansen at the seven-yard line to set up Dixie's second score on the next play. **Special Teams** - Kevin Miles, Humboldt State (WR, 5-8, 172, Sr., Sacramento, CA – Del Campo) had 64 yards on five punt returns, including one for 30 yards. He also caught three passes for 27 yards.

Week of Sept. 5-11: Offense – Evan Mozzochi, Western Oregon (QB, 6-4, 230, Sr., Vancouver, WA – Columbia River) had 280 yards in total offense in a 35-28 road win at Simon Fraser. He rushed for 73 yards on six carries and also completed 18 of 30 passes for 207 yards. Mozzochi accounted for three touchdowns, scoring on runs of 45 and 10 yards and also tossing a 34-yard TD pass to running back Trevor Roush. **Defense** – Chris Peterson, Humboldt State (OLB, 5-11, 208, Jr., San Diego, CA – Helix) had 11 tackles, including a 10-yard quarterback sack in the fourth quarter after CWU had recovered a fumble at the HSU 24 forcing the Wildcats to settle for a field goal. Peterson, who broke up one pass, had eight unassisted tackles among his 11 stops. **Special Teams** – Brian Blumberg, Humboldt State (K, 5-6, 166, Sr., Redondo Beach, CA) kicked a 27-yard field goal as time expired and also made five of five extra points. It was the second year in a row Blumberg had kicked a game-winning field goal to beat Central Washington.

Week of Sept. 12-18: Offense – Jesse Ence, Dixie State (RB, 5-10, 210, Sr., Saint George, UT – Pine View) had 155 all-purpose yards including 76 on 15 rushes and 79 on three receptions. He also scored two touchdowns in a 42-7 win over Simon Fraser, catching a 72-yard second-quarter touchdown pass and rushing for a three-yard TD in the third quarter. **Defense** – Bryce Peila, Western Oregon (DB, 6-1, 200, Jr., Central Point, OR - Crater) and Scotland Foss, Western Oregon (LB, 6-3, 235, Jr., Albany, OR – West Albany). . Both players had two takeaways as the Wolves defeated Central Washington 14-7 to end a 14-game losing streak to the Wildcats. Peila had a 50-yard interception return to set up the Wolves' second touchdown in the second quarter. He also had the first of two WOU interceptions in CWU territory in the final two minutes to protect a seven-point lead. Peila finished the contest with 79 return yards, including 70 on two interceptions and nine on one punt return. He also had four tackles, including a seven-yard quarterback sack. . Foss sealed WOU's win with an interception at the CWU 26 with 36 seconds left. In the second quarter, he recovered a fumble at the CWU 24 to set up WOU's first touchdown. Foss also finished the contest with nine tackles. **Special Teams** – None selected.

Week of Sept. 19-25: Offense – Trevor Gates, Western Oregon (WR, 5-9, 185, Sr., Hillsboro, OR – Valley Catholic & Northern Arizona) caught seven passes for a career-high 163 yards and two touchdowns as the Wolves cruised to a 56-0 win over Dixie State. Gates caught a 60-yard TD pass from Evan Mozzochi on the game's first play from scrimmage and also scored the only touchdown in the third quarter on a 10-yard pass from Mozzochi. **Defense** – Jona Faraimo, Humboldt State (LB, 5-11, 240, Sr., Sacramento, CA – Western HS) had a game-high 11 tackles, including seven solos and two tackles for losses of five yards. He also forced a fumble in HSU's 35-7 win at Simon Fraser. **Special Teams** – JJ Latu, Humboldt State (WR, 5-7, 160, Fr., Long Beach, CA) returned the opening kickoff 78 yards to set up a two-play, 5-yard touchdown drive. He finished the contest, his first at the collegiate level, with 139 all-purpose yards including 90 on two kickoffs and 49 on four receptions.

Week of Sept. 26-Oct. 2: Offense – Mike Proulx, Humboldt State (QB, 5-11, 203, Sr., Castro Valley, CA) threw for 315 yards and four touchdowns in the first half alone in the Lumberjacks' 56-27 home win over Dixie State. Proulx finished the contest completing 24 of 35 passes for 361 yards. He also rushed for 51 yards on five carries to finish the game with a GNAC season-best 412 yards in total offense, an average of 10.3 yards for each of the 40 plays he participated in. **Defense** – Taylor Tanasse, Central Washington (DE, 6-0, 240, Sr. Yakima, WA – West Valley) increased his season total in Tackles For Losses to eight in taking over the GNAC TFL lead. He had five total tackles, including four for losses of 16 yards sparking a defense that didn't allow a touchdown until midway through the fourth quarter by which time his team had built a 37-3 lead. **Special Teams** – Sean Davis, Central Washington (5-11, 180, Jr., Federal Way, WA – Todd

Beamer) had impressive numbers in every kicking category. He didn't miss a kick, converting four extra points and two field goals, including a 48-yarder which is the second longest this season in the GNAC. He also averaged 40.7 yards on three punts allowing only one return yard (40.4 net average). He also averaged 58.7 yards on seven kickoffs surrendering just 79 return yards for a 48.5 net average.

Week of Oct. 3-9: Offense – Stefan Cantwell, Dixie State (QB, 6-2, 220, Fr., South Jordan, UT - Bingham) had 442 yards in total offense and established two GNAC records in a 62-56 triple overtime loss at Simon Fraser. Cantwell completed 25 of 46 passes for 357 yards and five touchdowns and also rushed for 85 yards and three touchdowns. His five passing touchdowns tied a GNAC record shared by seven players. His eight rushing or passing touchdowns broke the GNAC single-game record of six held by two Central Washington quarterbacks – Zak Hill against Western Oregon in 2003 and Mike Reilly against the Wolves in 2005 and West Texas A&M in a 2008 playoff game. **Defense** – Jeremiah Maluia, Humboldt State (DB, 6-0, 196, So., Compton, CA) and Genesis Fonoimoana, Central Washington (DB, 6-1, 205, Jr., Long Beach, CA – Long Beach Poly). . Maluia led the Lumberjacks with nine tackles in their 23-17 win against Football Championship Sub-Division member UC Davis. He also had an interception at the 'Jack 33 to end a second-quarter Aggie scoring threat. Fonoimoana had several big plays to key the Wildcat defense that didn't allow a touchdown until late in the fourth quarter in a 41-10 win against Western Oregon. He recovered a fumble in the first quarter to set up a four-yard touchdown run by Levi Taylor. In the second quarter he had a 41-yard touchdown interception return to provide the Wildcats with a 27-3 halftime lead. He also had three tackles, including two for losses of 10 yards. **Special Teams** – Ian Sternau, Simon Fraser (K, 5-11, 185, Fr., Pasadena, CA – St. Francis) booted two field goals, including a 23-yarder with nine seconds remaining in regulation to force overtime in SFU's win against Dixie State. Sternau, who also kicked a 35-yarder in the first quarter and was six for six on extra points, averaged 41.7 yards on three punts.

Week of Oct. 10-16: Offense - Lyndon Rowells, Humboldt State (RB, 5-10, Sr., Largo, Fla. – College of the Redwoods) rushed for 223 yards and caught four passes for 41 yards accounting for more than 50 percent of Humboldt State's offense (264 of 512) in a 30-20 win at Central Washington, ending the Wildcats' 21-game conference home win streak. Rowells gave the 19th ranked 'Jacks a nine-point lead early in the third quarter, racing 67 yards to finish off a 10-play, 90-yard drive. He then scored on a one-yard run in the fourth period to give the 'Jacks a 16-point lead. His 264 all-purpose total is the fifth highest in GNAC history and his 223 rushing total ranks third all-time. **Defense** – Bryce Peila, Western Oregon (DB, 6-1, 200, Jr., Central Point, OR - Crater) had 129 return yards including 90 on two interceptions, 30 on a fumble recovery and nine on a punt return to lead the Wolves to a 34-10 win against Simon Fraser. With WOU leading 20-10 in the fourth quarter, Peila's fumble return set up a 10-yard touchdown run by Kenneth Haynes with 4:54 left. Thirty-eight seconds later, Peila, who also had nine tackles, sealed the win with a 48-yard touchdown interception return. Peila leads the GNAC with six interceptions for 195 yards. The yardage total is a GNAC single-season record, breaking the old mark of 163 by Brandon Kennedy of Central Washington in 2005. Peila has 12 career interceptions for 303 yards, which is 70 shy of Kennedy's career GNAC record. "Peila's two picks were very crucial plays," Western Oregon head football coach Arne Ferguson said. "They really put the game away." **Special Teams** – Jameson Schultz, Dixie State (K, 6-1, 175, Jr., Yucaipa, CA – Mt. San Jacinto) kicked four first-half field goals, three of distances of 40 or more yards, to account for all of the Red Storm first-half points in a 48-19 loss to Azusa Pacific. Schultz connected from 42, 32, 42 and 45 yards and also added a 13th point on a PAT in the fourth quarter. His four field

goals equals the GNAC single-game record shared by three other players including NFL veteran Michael Koenen of Western Washington.

Week of Oct. 17-23: Offense – Armahd Lewis, Central Washington (WR, 5-9, 178, Sr., Stockton, CA – Edison) scored on touchdown catches of 63 and 75 yards and also helped set up two other scores with lengthy kickoff returns as the Wildcats defeated Dixie State 31-24. Lewis had 220 all-purpose yards, including two receptions for 138 yards and three kickoff returns for 92 yards. His reception yardage is a GNAC single-game record for players with just two receptions. He had kickoff returns of 42 yards and 30 yards to set up a field goal and a touchdown after Dixie twice had pulled to within eight points in the second half. **Defense** - Isaiiah Buchanan, Western Oregon (DB, 5-10, 175, Sr., Portland, OR - Grant) had eight tackles, including a game-high seven solos, as the Wolves knocked off 15th ranked Humboldt State 40-24. Buchanan also forced a fumble and had a pass interception. **Special Teams** – Kelly Morgan, Western Oregon (K, 5-10, Sherwood, OR) tied the GNAC single-game record for most field goals made (4) and set a record for most field goals attempted (6). Morgan, who connected from 37, 30, 27 and 35 yards, also converted on four extra points to tie the GNAC single-game record for most points by a kicker of 16. He also averaged 57.7 yards on nine kickoffs, allowing an average of just 15.2 yards per return.

Week of Oct. 24-30: Offense – Victor Spencer, Humboldt State (WR, 5-10, 170, Jr., Sacramento, CA – Sacramento City JC) caught seven passes for 140 yards, including a 46-yarder down to the one-yard line to set up the Lumberjacks' third touchdown in a 42-10 win against Simon Fraser. On the season, Spencer has 33 catches for 540 yards and a pair of touchdowns. **Defense** - Devin Wells, Western Oregon (LB, 6-2, 255, So., Beaverton, OR – Southridge) had eight tackles, including a nine-yard quarterback sack at Dixie's four-yard line to set up a safety on the next play. Wells combined with Levi Smith for the sack, which came with the Wolves trailing 14-7 in the third quarter. Beginning with the safety, WOU scored 19 consecutive points to take control of the contest. **Special Teams** – Chris Campbell, Humboldt State (P, 5-10, 170, Fr., Granite Falls, CA) averaged 40.4 yards on five punts, including two inside the 20-yard line. The five punts were returned for just 10 yards.

Week of Oct. 31-Nov. 6: Offense – Lyndon Rowells, Humboldt State (RB, 5-10, 200, Sr., Largo, Fla.) rushed for 184 yards on 24 carries including a 61-yard touchdown run to lead the Lumberjacks to a 45-30 road win at Dixie State. Rowells also caught three passes for 60 yards, scoring on a 28-yard reception in the second quarter. He tied the GNAC record for most 100-yard career rushing game recording his 13th, six of them this season. That matches the record set by Emilio Iniguez of Central Washington in 2003 and 2004 and matched by Eliot Vinzant of Western Oregon in 2005 and 2006. **Defense** - Adam Berger, Simon Fraser (DB, 6-0, 205, Jr., Surrey, BC – Lord Tweedsmuir) and Brendan Faubion, Humboldt State (DE, 6-1, 250, Sr., Pleasanton, CA). . Berger had a game-changing 43-yard interception touchdown return as Simon Fraser beat Central Washington 35-24. Berger's TD gave the Clan a 28-17 lead with 5:01 remaining after it had rallied from a 17-6 fourth-quarter deficit. He also had three tackles helping the Clan hold the Wildcats to 198 passing yards and 359 in total offense. . Faubion had seven tackles, including two for losses of 11 yards as Humboldt jumped to a 31-0 third-quarter lead against Dixie State. Faubion also had a fumble recovery. **Special Teams** – None selected.

GNAC FOOTBALL ALL-TIME PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

Week of Nov. 7-13: Offense – Lyndon Rowells, Humboldt State (RB, 5-10, 200, Sr., Largo, Fla.) rushed for 246 yards - equaling the second highest single-game total in GNAC history - in a 37-7 win over Western Oregon as the Lumberjacks won their first-ever GNAC title and their 10th football championship in the history of the program. Rowells set two GNAC single-game or season records and tied another in the contest. He set the conference single season rushing record finishing the regular campaign with 1,417 yards breaking the old record of 1,327 by Nat Conley of Central Washington in 2001. He also set the GNAC record for most 100-yard career rushing games (14) and tied the single-season record of seven. **Defense** - Jeremiah Maluia, Humboldt State (DB, 6-0, 196, So., Compton, CA) tied a GNAC record with three interceptions and also had three tackles. Maluia equaled the interception record set by HSU's Duval Seamster against Saint Mary's in 2003 and equaled by Bret Hughes of Western Oregon against Western Washington in both 2004 and 2005 and Stan Langlow of Central Washington last season against Simon Fraser. He also helped the Lumberjacks set a GNAC team record with seven. Central Washington set the old mark of six last season against Simon Fraser. **Special Teams** – Dominique Gaisie, Central Washington (DB, 5-9, 162, Sr., West Covina, CA – Bishop Amat Memorial/Utah State) had 60 yards on two punt returns including a 63-yarder for a touchdown to give the Wildcats an early lead in their 42-14 home win against Dixie State. Gaisie ended up leading the GNAC in both punt returns (11.3) and kickoff returns (25.1). He also had four tackles and a pass breakup in the contest.

2012

Week of Aug. 27-Sept. 2: Offense - Nick Ricciardulli, Humboldt State (RB, 5-8, 190, Jr., Poway, CA) rushed for 159 yards on 24 carries, scoring on touchdown runs of one and 74 yards in the Lumberjacks' 38-13 win over Colorado Mesa. Ricciardulli also had three receptions and finished with 162 all-purpose yards. His 74-yard jaunt equals the fifth longest in conference history. **Defense** – Alex Markarian, Humboldt State (DE, 6-4, 245, So., Chino Hills, CA) had nine tackles including six solos and three quarterback sacks for losses of 16. **Special Teams** – Kelly Morgan, Western Oregon (K, 5-10, 170, Sr., Sherwood, OR) kicked a 53-yard field goal – the second-longest in GNAC history - and also connected from 30 yards and on both of his extra point attempts extending his streak to 58 in the Wolves' 48-20 loss to Grand Valley. He also averaged 65.6 yards on five kickoffs, two of which were touchbacks.

Week of Sept. 3-9: Offense - Demetrius Sumler, Central Washington (RB, 5-10, 220, Sr., San Diego, CA – Cathedral Catholic) rushed for 154 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Wildcats to a GNAC record setting rushing performance in a 56-28 win at Simon Fraser. CWU, which finished with 316 rushing yards, scored six touchdowns on the ground equaling the GNAC single-game record. **Defense** – Jeremiah Maluia, Humboldt State (DB, 5-11, 202, Jr., Compton, CA) forced two fumbles and also intercepted a pass leading to three touchdowns as the defending GNAC champions opened their conference season with a 42-17 home win over Azusa Pacific. In the first quarter, he forced a fumble to set up Humboldt's first touchdown, a 26-yard pass from Alex Rump to Victor Spencer. Later in the period he had a 25-yard interception to set up a two-yard touchdown run by Nick Ricciardulli. Early in the third quarter he forced a fumble, which he returned 62 yards for a touchdown. He and the rest of the Jacks' secondary held Azusa Pacific to 132 net passing yards, and now rank No. 5 nationally in pass efficiency defense. Maluia also had two tackles. **Special Teams** – Alexander Bradt, Western Oregon (LB, 6-1, 210, Fr., Salem, OR – West Salem) averaged 47.4 yards on five punts, including a long of 73 that was just one yard shy of the GNAC record.

Week of Sept. 10-16: Offense - Nick Ricciardulli, Humboldt State (RB, 5-8, 190, Jr., Poway, CA) rushed for a career-high 204 yards on 33 carries,

averaging 6.2 yards to lead the Lumberjacks to a 41-21 home win against Simon Fraser. Ricciardulli scored a touchdown and broke a long run of 48 yards to set up another. He also caught two passes for 18 yards as the 'Jacks improved to 3-0. **Defense** - Cedrique Chaney, Central Washington (DB, 6-0, 188, Fr., Kelso, WA) saved four potential Western Oregon touchdowns in the Wildcats' 21-14 overtime win at Monmouth. Chaney had a GNAC-record tying three interceptions, two in the end zone and another at the Wildcat 11-yard line. He also forced a fumble deep in CWU territory in the fourth quarter which was returned 56 yards by defensive back Kevin Puckett to set up a 34-yard, five-play drive which culminated with a nine-yard touchdown run by Johri Fogerson to tie the game with 4:13 remaining in regulation. Chaney, who also had five tackles, got his first interception in the end zone on a third-and-goal play from the 10-yard line, on Western Oregon's first drive of the game. In the second quarter, on a first-and-10 play from the 13, he earned another end zone interception to set up a CWU kneel down to end the first half. In the third quarter, he intercepted a pass on a first-and-10 from the 36-yard line to end another WOU drive. His fourth-quarter forced fumble came after Western Oregon had drove to CWU to set up a potential game-clinching score. **Special Teams** - Cache Morgan, Dixie State (KR/DB, 5-11, 190, Sr., West Jordan, UT – Utah State) had three kickoff returns for 135 yards, including the second 100-yard return of his career to equal his own GNAC record. He also had a five-yard interception return and a total of six tackles from his defensive back position as the Red Storm beat Azusa Pacific 24-22 to improve to 2-0 in GNAC play.

Week of Sept. 17-23: Offense – Demetrius Sumler, Central Washington (RB, 5-10, 220, Sr., San Diego, CA – Cathedral Catholic) rushed for 148 yards including touchdowns from three, four and 50 yards leading the Wildcats to a 41-17 win against Azusa Pacific at Pop Keeney Stadium in Bothell. Sumler's second touchdown came with 3:56 left in the first half and his third touchdown came early in the third quarter opening up a 27-7 lead. Sumler also had two receptions for 11 yards. **Defense** – Scotland Foss, Western Oregon (LB, 6-3, 235, Sr., Albany, OR – West Albany) had two interceptions, including one in the end zone with 24 seconds remaining, to seal the Wolves' 20-16 home win against Simon Fraser. The clinching interception came after Simon Fraser quarterback Trey Wheeler had completed seven consecutive passes driving his team from his own 22 to the WOU 14. Foss also had six tackles, including four primaries. **Special Teams** - Chris Campbell, Humboldt State (P/LB, 5-11, 230, Jr., San Diego, CA) averaged 42.3 yards on three punts including a fourth-quarter boot that traveled 48 yards before it hit the ground with backspin and remained in place at the DSC 4-yard line.

Week of Sept. 24-30: Offense – Bo Palmer, Simon Fraser (RB, 5-9, 209, Sr., North Vancouver, BC) rushed for 145 yards on just 17 carries and scored four touchdowns leading the Clan to a 41-28 home win over Dixie State. Palmer scored in each period – from two yards in the first quarter, 37 early in the second period, 54 late in the third stanza and one midway through the fourth quarter as the Clan earned their first conference victory of the season. Palmer, who averaged 8.5 yards per rush, also caught four passes for 23 yards as SFU had a total of 463 yards in total offense. **Defense** – Isaiah Davis, Central Washington (CB, 6-0, 176, Fr., Bremerton, WA – South Kitsap) had 10 tackles and broke up three passes (including two in the end zone) leading the Wildcats to a 31-3 win over ninth-ranked Humboldt State, which came into the contest ranked ninth nationally in scoring averaging 42.5 points. Davis also had 98 return yards, including 42 yards on five punt returns and 56 on two kickoffs. His 40-yard return on the game's opening kickoff set up a 56-yard, 11-play touchdown drive. **Special Teams** – Alexander Bradt, Western Oregon (P, 6-1, 210, Fr., Salem, OR – West Salem) averaged 42.8 yards on eight punts including a long of 54 in the Wolves' 20-7 road win at Azusa Pacific. Bradt currently ranks eighth nationally in punting averaging 44.1 yards per attempt.

Week of Oct. 1-7: Offense – Trey Wheeler, Simon Fraser (QB, 6-1, 190, So., Seattle, WA – Liberty) completed 32 of 47 passes for 378 yards and four touchdowns as the Clan matched the GNAC record for most points scored in a conference game in a 66-38 home win against Azusa Pacific. Wheeler, who has had four of the five highest passing totals this fall in the GNAC (404, 378, 312 and 310), led SFU to a 654-yard offensive output in the contest. SFU matched Humboldt State's record for most points it accomplished in a 66-20 win on Nov. 13, 2010 against the Clan. **Defense** – Kraig Akins, Western Oregon (DE, 6-2, 280, So., Springfield, OR – Thurston) had seven tackles, including two quarterback sacks as the Wolves held previously nationally 24th-ranked Humboldt State to 230 yards in a 42-14 win at the Redwood Bowl. **Special Teams** – Austin Haslem, Dixie State (K, 5-9, 170, Fr., Philomath, OR) averaged 55 yards on kickoffs and also scored five points, kicking two extra points and a 27-yard field goal as the Red Storm beat first-place Central Washington 29-21.

Week of Oct. 8-14: Offense - Cody VonAppen, Western Oregon (QB, 5-10, 200, Sr., Kailua, HI) and Demetrius Sumler, Central Washington (RB, 5-10, 220, Sr., San Diego, CA – Colorado) ... VonAppen completed 16 of 27 passes for 424 yards and four touchdowns as the Wolves used a 21-point first quarter and a 28-point fourth quarter to cruise to a 66-20 win over Dixie State. VonAppen had one of the most efficient games in GNAC history by a quarterback averaging a GNAC-record 26.5 yards per completion. The previous record for yards per completion was 25.5 by WOU's Josh Riddell (13-332) against CWU in 2008. Sumler rushed for 226 yards and tied a GNAC record with five rushing touchdowns to lead the Wildcats to a 51-10 Homecoming win before 5,120 fans at Tomlinson Stadium. Sumler scored on runs of one and 47 yards in the first quarter, 27 in the second quarter, eight in the third quarter and 37 in the fourth quarter moving into third place in the nation in scoring with 84 points. He also caught three passes for four yards. **Defense** - Colton Russi, Humboldt State (LB, 6-2, 240, Jr., Meadow Vista, CA) who was coming back from a leg injury that kept him out of the lineup for three games, made several big hits and led the Jacks in tackles with nine in a 24-20 win over Azusa Pacific. **Special Teams** - Chris Campbell, Humboldt State (P, 5-10, 170, So., Granite Bay, CA) averaged 40.8 yards on eight punts, including a long of 51 yards in the Lumberjacks' 24-20 win over Azusa Pacific. Campbell placed two punts inside the 20-yard line and didn't have a touchback.

Week of Oct. 15-21: Offense - Nick Ricciardulli, Humboldt State (RB, 5-8, 190, Jr., Poway, Calif.) rushed for 206 yards on only 18 carries, scoring three touchdowns and surpassing 200 yards for the third time this season and the second consecutive game to claim his third *Red Lion Player of the Week* award this fall. He was also the Jacks' leading receiver with four catches for 83 yards, including a 60-yard touchdown hook-up from quarterback Casey Mintz. Ricciardulli, who ranks third in NCAA Division II rushing with 158.6 yards per game, has gone over the 100-yard mark in all but one of the 'Jacks eight games to equal a GNAC single-season record for most 100-yard rushing games of seven. **Defense** - Nick Grunsky, Azusa Pacific (SS, 5-10, 190, Jr., Folsom, CA – Vista del Lago) had an interception at the Cougars' 11-yard line with 12 seconds left to seal a 24-17 upset of Central Washington. Just prior to the interception, he was credited with a pass breakup. Grunsky also earned eight tackles in the win. **Special Teams** - Gustave Benthin, Western Oregon (DL, 6-2, 285, Jr., Nampa, ID) blocked an 18-yard field goal attempt that would have tied the game with 6:30 left in the fourth-quarter as the Wolves extended their win streak to five games with a 20-17 road win at Simon Fraser. He also had seven tackles and assisted on a tackle for a loss.

Week of Oct. 22-28: Offense – Lemar Durant, Simon Fraser (WR, 6-2, 226, So., Coquitlam, BC) caught 12 passes for 228 yards and four touchdowns to lead the Clan to a 58-47 win over Dixie State. Durant tied a GNAC single-game record for most touchdown receptions and his yardage total was just eight yards shy of the GNAC single-game record. He had TD catches of 10, 73, 27 and six yards, four of a GNAC single-game record six thrown by Clan quarterback Trey Wheeler. **Defense** - Ryan Moreno, Humboldt State (LB, 6-0, 207, Poway, CA) and Sean Barber, Azusa Pacific (LB, 6-1, 225, Jr., Edgewood, WA – Puyallup) ... Moreno scored the Lumberjacks' first touchdown on a 20-yard interception return. The true freshman then forced Central Washington, which was trailing 14-7, to settle for a fourth-quarter field goal after breaking up a pass attempt on third down. He also made five tackles as the defending champion 'Jacks took command of the GNAC race with a 14-10 victory ... Barber had 11 tackles, including one for a loss, and also had an interception, leading Azusa Pacific to a 19-3 win over Western Oregon, which came into the game with a five-game win streak. The win was the second straight for the Cougars after opening the season with seven losses. **Special Teams** – Jamie Cacciatore, Azusa Pacific (K, 5-8, 175, Fr., Orange, CA – El Modena) tied a GNAC single-game record kicking four field goals (from 25, 18, 33 and 25 yards) to provide all his team's scoring prior to a touchdown in the final 11 seconds of the game. Cacciatore leads the GNAC in field goals this season, making 12 of 17.

Week of Oct. 29-Nov. 4: Offense – Terrell Watson, Azusa Pacific (RB, 6-2, 235, So., Oxnard, CA) and Ryan Robertson, Central Washington (QB, 6-4, 202, Sr., Sammamish, WA – Eastlake) ... Watson rushed for 214 yards on 26 carries including a pair of touchdown runs of 44 and 10 yards. On APU's final drive of the game, he had 31 yards on three carries to set up a game-winning 24-yard field goal by Jamie Cacciatore with eight seconds left on the clock. Robertson completed 23 of 29 passes for 240 yards and three touchdowns and was not intercepted as the Wildcats moved into a tie for first place with Humboldt State with a 36-32 win over Western Oregon. Robertson's 19-yard touchdown pass to Anthony Spain with 3:05 left gave CWU the victory. **Defense** – Tyler Thornton, Azusa Pacific (SS, 5-8, 178, So., Bakersfield, CA – Centennial) led the Cougars with 11 tackles, including seven solos and also had two interceptions as APU ran its win streak to three games after opening the season with seven losses. **Special Teams** – Lucas Gonsalves, Western Oregon (WR, 5-9, 175, Jr., Kailua, HI – St. Louis HS) had a 89-yard punt return with 9:12 left in the fourth quarter as the Wolves scored 22 consecutive points in the frame to take a 32-29 lead before CWU got a late touchdown to pull out the victory. The punt return equaled the second longest in GNAC history.

Week of Nov. 5-11: Offense – Ryan Robertson, Central Washington (QB, 6-4, 202, Sr., Sammamish, WA – Eastlake) completed 18 of 19 passes for 249 yards and three touchdowns to lead the Wildcats to a 51-19 home win against Dixie State. Robertson set one GNAC record in the contest (for highest completion percentage) and tied another by completing his final 15 passes equaling the conference record for most consecutive completions. **Defense** – Michael Akins, Western Oregon (LB, 6-3, 225, Sr., Springfield, OR – Thurston) returned an interception 34 yards for a touchdown to give the Wolves an early 14-6 lead on the way to a 38-22 win against Humboldt State. Akins also had four tackles, including three unassisted stops. **Special Teams** – Jake Tepper, Central Washington (DL, 6-5, 295, Jr., Los Angeles, CA – College of the Canyons) blocked a pair of extra points, one of which was converted into a two-point defensive PAT.

Week of Sept. 2-8: Offense – Ryan Stanford, Simon Fraser (QB, 6-3, 199, So., Phoenix, AZ) threw for 446 yards and three touchdowns as the Clan upset Humboldt State 41-27 at the Redwood Bowl handing the Lumberjacks just their third home loss in the past four seasons. Stanford completed 33 of 46 passes. His yardage total is the fifth highest single-game total in GNAC history. **Defense** – Casey Chin, Simon Fraser (LB, 5-10, 214, Sr., Port Moody, BC – New Westminster) had 10 tackles, including one for a loss of two yards, and a pair of fourth-quarter interceptions in the Clan's victory. His first interception, which he returned 70 yards, came on a first down from the Clan 19 with 2:51 left. He then sealed the victory with another interception with 48 seconds remaining. **Special Teams** – Chris Campbell, Humboldt State (P, 5-11, 175, Jr., Granite Bay, CA) averaged 47 yards on six punts, including five that went inside the 20. His longest punt was 63 yards.

Week of Sept. 9-15: Offense – Terrell Watson, Azusa Pacific (RB, 6-2, 230, Jr., Oxnard, CA) rushed for 165 yards and two touchdowns as the Cougars extended their conference game win streak to five games with a 36-20 road win at Dixie State. Watson also surpassed the 2,000-yard career rushing mark increasing his total to 2,130. He also extended his streak of games with a rushing touchdown to eight and his streak of games rushing for 165 or more yards to four. **Defense** – Deionte Gordon, Central Washington (DB, 6-1, 203, Sr., Seaside, CA – Sacramento State) had three takeaways, setting up two of the Wildcats' three touchdowns in a 20-7 home win against Western Oregon. Gordon set up CWU's second first-quarter touchdown with a 22-yard interception return to the WOU 20-yard line. He also had an interception late in the first half and then forced and recovered a fumble in the third period, leading to a 5-play, 43-yard touchdown drive. He also had five tackles and broke up a pass. **Special Teams** – Jamie Cacciatore, Azusa Pacific (K, 5-8, 175, So., Orange, CA – El Modena) booted a 52-yard field goal – equaling the third longest in GNAC history – in the Cougars 36-20 road win at Dixie State. The field goal was the 11th 50-yarder in conference history and was just two yards shy of the GNAC record held by Western Washington's Michael Koenen. The NFL veteran booted a 54-yarder against Central Oklahoma in 2001.

Week of Sept. 16-22: Offense – Chris Tolbert, Simon Fraser (RB, 6-0, 190, Jr., Silver Springs, MD) and Ryan Bergman, Western Oregon (QB, 6-2, 175, Jr., Issaquah, WA) ... Tolbert, a transfer from Central Connecticut, scored twice in the fourth quarter to power the Clan to a 21-14 road win at Central Washington. He rushed for 106 yards, including a 10-yard touchdown run which set up a game-tying two-point conversion pass from quarterback Ryan Stanford to Bobby Pospischil. Later in the period Tolbert caught a 27-yard TD pass from Ryan Blum after Stanford had handed the ball off to Blum as the Clan beat the Wildcats in Ellensburg for the first time since 1980. Tolbert caught a total of four passes for 38 yards ... Bergman tied the GNAC and the WOU school record tossing six touchdown passes in a 51-32 home win. Bergman completed 23 of 32 passes for 417 yards. Bergman tied the school record set by Jim Bowlen in 1957 against Lower Columbia and the conference record set last season by SFU's Trey Wheeler against Dixie State. **Defense** – Sean Barber, Azusa Pacific (LB, 6-1, 220, Sr., Edgewood, WA - Puyallup) had 15 tackles and two fumble recoveries as the Cougar defense held Humboldt State's offense scoreless in a 28-2 win. It was the second this season Barber has accounted for two of APU's takeaways in a game. Barber also had a pass breakup.

Week of Sept. 23-29: Offense – Griff Robles, Dixie State (QB, 6-5, 230, Sr., Spanish Fork, UT) and Jordan Todd, Central Washington (RB, 5-6, 186, So., Bellevue, WA – Interlake) ... Robles had 401 yards in total offense and accounted for six touchdowns leading the Red Storm to a 49-24 road win at Humboldt State. Robles completed 22 of 46 passes for 283 yards and three

touchdowns and also rushed for 118 yards and three touchdowns. He scored on runs of 1, 1 and 12 yards and tossed TD passes of eight yards to Mitch Frei, 26 yards to Joel Davis and 17 to Joe Don Duncan ... Todd rushed for a GNAC-season high 189 yards and set up a first-quarter touchdown with a 53-yard run to lead Central Washington to a 7-3 win at Azusa Pacific. **Defense** – Kraig Akins, Western Oregon (DE, 6-2, 270, Jr., Springfield, OR - Thurston) and Daniel Moffett, Dixie State (FS, 6-2, 215, Jr., Kayville, UT – Davis) ... Akins had 11 tackles, including three for losses totaling 21 yards as the Wolves held previously unbeaten Simon Fraser to just three field goals in a 30-9 win. Among Akins three TFLs were two quarterback sacks. He also forced two fumbles. Moffett had a GNAC-record tying three interceptions (for 56 yards) in Dixie's 49-24 win at Humboldt State. Moffett, who also had four tackles and broke up a pass, is the sixth player in GNAC history to record three interceptions in a single game. **Specialty** – Isaiah Davis, Central Washington (DB, 5-10, 176, So., Bremerton, WA – South Kitsap) had 100 return yards for the Wildcats, netting 66 on four punt returns and 34 on two kickoff returns and providing valuable field position in a 7-3 win at Azusa Pacific.

Week of Sept. 30-Oct. 6: Offense – Griff Robles, Dixie State (QB, 6-5, 230, Sr., Spanish Fork, UT) had more than 400 yards in total offense for the second week in a row leading the Red Storm to a 39-12 win against Simon Fraser. Robles finished with a GNAC season-high 427 yards, rushing for 176 yards and completing 13 of 27 passes for 251 yards. He contributed six touchdowns, scoring on runs of 15 in the first quarter and 34 in the third quarter and tossing TD passes of 9 yards to Randon Willard in the opening period, 11 to tight end Joe Don Duncan and 7 to Willard in the second quarter and 48 to Duncan in the third period. **Defense** – Isaiah Davis, Central Washington (DB, 5-10, 176, So., Bremerton, WA – South Kitsap) tied a GNAC single-game record with three interceptions and also had seven tackles in a 21-13 road win at Humboldt State. Davis' first interception in the third quarter came near midfield, however, the latter two came in the fourth period deep in Humboldt territory (at the 14-yard line on a second-and-three play from the 38 and at the 10-yard line on a first-and-10 play from the 30). Davis also broke up two other passes and had 104 return yards, including seven on one punt return, 80 on three kickoffs and 17 on the three interceptions. He is the seventh player in GNAC history to record three interceptions in the same contest. **Specialty** – Jamie Cacciatore, Azusa Pacific (K, 5-8, 175, So., Orange, CA – El Modena) was a perfect four of four of field goals converting from 40, 26, 28 and 26 yards as the Cougars edged Western Oregon 34-32.

Week of Oct. 7-13: Offense – Terrell Watson, Azusa Pacific (RB, 6-2, 230, Jr., Oxnard, CA) rushed for a school-record 302 yards and a school and GNAC-record tying five touchdowns (1, 2, 70, 68 and 8) as the Cougars overcame a 23-3 halftime deficit to defeat Simon Fraser 44-36. In the fourth quarter alone, Watson rushed for 232 yards and four touchdowns. That included a 61-yard non-scoring run to set up his final touchdown. He also caught one pass for six yards to earn 308 all-purpose yards. Watson's per carry rushing average of 10.8 eclipsed the GNAC record for most yards per carry (min. of 20 attempts) of 9.7 set by SFU's Bo Palmer (20-194) three years ago against Dixie State. **Defense** – Shane Kuenzi, Western Oregon (LB, 6-0, 200, So., Salem, OR – West Salem) and Tyler Thornton, Azusa Pacific (FS, 5-8, 182, Jr., Bakersfield, CA - Centennial) ... Kuenzi had a team-high 10 tackles in a 38-21 home win over Humboldt State. He also forced a fumble, had an interception and broke up a pass ... Thornton had 12 tackles, including eight solos, and also broke up two passes in the Cougars' eight-point home win over Simon Fraser. **Specialty** – Jesse Zalk, Central Washington (WR, 5-8, 153, Fr., Battle Ground, WA - Prairie) had 217 all-purpose yards, including 113 on three kickoff returns and 104 yards on a GNAC season-high 14 receptions. In the second quarter, he returned a kickoff 53 yards to set up a 34-yard field goal by Sean McDonald. Zalk later

helped CWU rally from a 17-3 deficit tying the game at 24-24 on a seven-yard TD reception with 2:28 left. He then set up a game-winning 44-yard field goal with one second left with a 26-yard catch to the Dixie 29 with 14 seconds remaining.

Week of Oct. 14-20: Offense – Tyrell Williams, Western Oregon (WR, 6-4, 200, Jr., Salem, OR – Cascade) caught five passes for 184 yards including touchdowns of 74 and 67 yards to lead the Wolves to a 46-34 road victory at Dixie State. Williams broke his own GNAC-record for most yards per catch (min. 5 catches) with his 36.8 average. He set the old GNAC record of 32.8 last season catching six passes for 197 yards in a game against Dixie State.

Defense – Austin Schnizler, Central Washington (DT, 6-3, 266, Sr., Ventura, CA – St. Bonaventure/Idaho State) had three quarterback sacks for losses of 24 yards and he also tackled running back Stephen Spagnuolo in the end zone for a safety to lead the Wildcats to a 54-14 win at Simon Fraser. He finished the contest with five tackles, including four for losses of 25 yards and was also credited with a forced fumble. **Specialty** – Matt Burke, Central Washington (P, 6-0, 192, Sr., Laguna, Hills, CA – Cabrillo) averaged 43.3 yards on three punts and did not allow a return yard as CWU maintained its Top 20 national ranking in punt return defense, allowing just 3.4 yards per return. Burke also tossed a 54-yard TD pass to Deionte Gordon on a fake punt in the second quarter to give the Wildcats a 30-14 lead.

Week of Oct. 21-26: Offense – Griff Robles, Dixie State (QB, 6-5, 230, Sr., Spanish Fork, UT – Utah) rushed for 217 yards and three touchdowns and passed for 267 yards and one score leading the Red Storm to a 28-19 home win over Humboldt State. His 484 yards in total offense is the third highest single-game total in GNAC history and is rushing total ranks 11th all-time in conference history. He is the first player in conference history to rush and pass for at least 200 yards in the same game. Robles scored on runs of two, 21 and 50 yards in the first, second and fourth quarters, respectively. The latter touchdown came with 7:56 remaining after the Lumberjacks had pulled to within two points with 9:41 left on a 39-yard field goal by Matt Bruder. **Defense** – Steven Fanua, Azusa Pacific (LB, 6-1, 227, Jr., Milpitas, CA – California) had 15 tackles and a key forced fumble to lead the Cougars to a 24-17 road win at Central Washington as the Cougars took over first place in the GNAC. Ten of his 15 tackles were solos and he also broke up two passes. His forced fumble, which he also recovered, came with 2:59 left in the fourth quarter after CWU had executed its second successful onside kick of the game. Following Fanua's recovery, APU got two first downs to run out the remaining time left on the clock and preserve the victory. **Special Teams** – Tarik Myles, Azusa Pacific (KR, 5-6, 152, Fr., Rancho Cucamonga, CA – Summit) and Jesse Correa, Western Oregon (5-10, 185, So., Mililani, HI – St. Louis) ... Myles gave the Cougars the lead at 14-10 in the second quarter returning a kickoff 92 yards for a touchdown. He also had a 22-yard return on another kickoff ... Correa kicked field goals of 46, 48 and 32 yards in the Wolves' 30-16 win against Simon Fraser. His 48-yarder was the third longest this fall in the GNAC and his 46-yarder equaled the fourth longest.

Week of Oct. 27-Nov. 3: Offense – Jake Nelson, Central Washington (QB, 6-1, 205, Fr., Lake Stevens, WA) had 238 yards in total offense to lead the Wildcats to a 21-14 win over Humboldt State. Nelson completed 15 of 22 passes for 172 yards and two touchdowns and also rushed for 66 yards on 11 carries. He tossed a 17-yard TD pass to Jordin Kinnune in the first quarter, then threw a three-yard TD to Colter Clinch to give CWU a 21-7 lead early in the fourth quarter. **Defense** – Nick Grunsky, Azusa Pacific (SS, 5-11, 192, Sr., Folsom, CA) had eight tackles, including 1 ½ for losses of seven yards as the Cougars maintained a one-game lead in the GNAC race with a 38-28 win over Western Oregon. Grunsky also had an interception and broke up two passes. **Special Teams** – Tarik Myles, Azusa

Pacific (KR, 5-6, 152, Fr., Rancho Cucamonga, CA) had 132 return yards – 66 on four punts and 66 on two kickoffs in APU's home win. He also caught eight passes for 98 yards, finishing with 230 all-purpose yards.

Week of Nov. 4-10: Offense – Terrell Watson, Azusa Pacific (RB, 6-2, 230, Jr., Oxnard, CA) and Ryan Bergman, Western Oregon (QB, 6-2, 175, Jr., Issaquah, WA) ... Watson rushed for 123 yards and one touchdown and also caught four passes for 33 yards as the Cougars clinched the GNAC title with a 23-20 win over Dixie State. In the process, Watson set a GNAC single-season rushing record with 1,582 yards, eclipsing the old mark of 1,579 by Humboldt State's Nick Ricciardulli last season. Watson scored on a five-yard run in the fourth quarter tying the game at 13-13 and also tying the GNAC single-season record of 18 rushing touchdowns set by Willie Johnson of Central Washington in 2002 ... Bergman passed for 405 yards and four touchdowns to lead the Wolves to a 32-26 win over Central Washington. Bergman leads the GNAC this season with three 400-yard passing games. Saturday's effort came against a Central Washington defense that hadn't allowed more than 24 points in a single game all season and had allowed less than 200 yards passing in five of its six previous contests. Among his touchdown passes was a GNAC season-long 78-yard pass to Dustin Hurd. **Defense** – Casey Chin, Simon Fraser (LB, 5-10, 214, Sr., Port Moody, BC – New Westminster) had a GNAC single-game record 6 ½ tackles for losses of 27 yards including 2 ½ sacks for losses of 17, in leading the Clan to a 38-17 home win against Humboldt State. Chin, who had 15 tackles including 10 solos, broke the old GNAC record for tackles of losses of six set by Jacob Galloway of Central Washington against Eastern Oregon in 2004. Chin came into the contest ranked eighth nationally in tackles. On the season he now has 110 tackles, including 61 solos. The GNAC single-season records are 128 and 66, respectively, by Caleb Jessup of Western Washington during the 2008 season. **Special Teams** – Chase Krivashei, Humboldt State (WR/KR, 5-9, 165, Fr., Corona, CA - Centennial) had 138 return yards in setting a GNAC single-game record for all-purpose yards, finishing with 331 yards. Krivashei had 113 yards on five kickoff returns and 25 on four punts. He also had 179 yards on 12 receptions. The old all-purpose record was 322 by Nat Conley of Central Washington in 2001 against Humboldt State. On the season, Krivashei ranks second in the GNAC in all-purpose yards (159.3) and is the conference leader in receptions with 86 for 845 yards.

Week of Nov. 11-17: Offense – Jordan Todd, Central Washington (RB, 5-6, 186, So., Bellevue, WA - Newport) and Dasmien Stewart, Azusa Pacific (QB, 6-4, 225, Sr., Oxnard, CA) ... Todd rushed for 226 yards on 24 carries including a 55-yard touchdown run in the second quarter in becoming the 12th player in school history to surpass the 1,000-yard barrier. Todd, who missed one full game with an injury and half of another contest, completed the season with 1,213 yards and nine touchdowns ... Stewart completed 10 of 15 passes for 252 yards as the Cougars ran their win streak to seven games with a 28-19 road win at Simon Fraser. Stewart's 16.8 yards per attempt and 25.2 yards per completion were both just shy of the GNAC single-game records of 17.8 and 26.5, respectively. **Defense** – Ridge Nielsen, Central Washington (LB, 5-11, 231, Sr., Mesa, AZ – Mountain View) had 10 tackles, including 3 ½ for losses of 20 yards as the Wildcats defeated Dixie State 44-0 posting the first shutout in the GNAC since Western Oregon blanked the Red Storm 56-0 on Sept. 24, 2011. Nielsen helped hold DSU quarterback Griff Robles to 101 yards in total offense including 75 passing snapping Robles' GNAC-record streak of eight consecutive 300-yard contests. **Special Teams** – Jesse Correa, Western Oregon (K, 5-10, 185, So., Mililani, HI) booted 42 and 39-yard field goals and also was two of two on extra points in a 26-14 road win at Humboldt State. Correa finished the season converting on 10 of 15 field goals, including three of 40 yards or more.

Week of Sept. 1-7: Offense - Terrell Watson, Azusa Pacific (RB, 6-2, 240, Sr., Oxnard, CA) rushed for 202 yards and three touchdowns as the Cougars upset nationally second-ranked Grand Valley State 26-23 in double overtime in a CBS Sports Network national broadcast Thursday. In the overtime session, Watson, who had a career-high 42 carries, took the ball on all 11 of APU's snaps, including a crucial 11-yard gain on 3rd-and-9 down to the one-yard line to set up the winning score. **Defense** - C.J. Broussard, Azusa Pacific (CB, 6-0, 190, So., Clovis, CA) and Travis Hansen, Humboldt State (LB, 235, Sr., San Anselmo, CA - Siskiyous/Nevada) ... Broussard had eight tackles, forced and recovered a fumble in the red zone and had an interception near midfield returning it 24 yards to set up a go-ahead TD late in the third quarter in the Cougars' 26-23 win. He also had three pass breakups. ... Hansen had six tackles, including three for losses of eight yards as the Lumberjacks rallied from a 14-3 deficit early in the second quarter to beat Texas A&M - Kingsville 27-14 and end a 13-game losing streak dating back to late in the 2012 season. He also forced a fumble and intercepted a pass as HSU held the Lone Star Conference team to 256 yards in total offense, including 98 rushing. **Special Teams** - Paul Revis, Western Oregon (WR, 165, Fr., Scappoose, OR) had 265 all-purpose yards, including 129 on six kick returns and 27 on three punt returns in a 45-38 loss to NCAA Division I Football Championship Series (FCS) Portland State. He also caught eight passes for 109 yards, including touchdown catches of 26 and 48 yards. The latter came with 46 seconds left pulling the Wolves to within seven points.

Week of Sept. 8-14: Offense - Ja'Quan Gardner, Humboldt State (RB, 5-7, 175, Fr., Ceres, CA - Central Valley) rushed for 136 yards on just 16 carries as the Lumberjacks defeated AFCA 14th ranked Azusa Pacific 30-10. Gardner scored on touchdown runs of 54 and six yards in the first four minutes of the game as HSU bolted to a 30-3 halftime lead. Gardner leads the GNAC in rushing with 292 yards and ranks 10th in NCAA Division II. **Defense** - Kevin Haynes, Central Washington (LB, 6-0, 230, Fr., Brush Prairie, WA - Battle Ground) led the Wildcats with nine tackles and also had his team's only two interceptions in a 48-14 home win over Dixie State as CWU held the Red Storm to 235 yards in total offense. The previous week Dixie gained 640 yards in an overtime loss at Colorado Mesa. **Special Teams** - Nikolai Karpun, Simon Fraser (P, 6-0, 203, Jr., North Delta, BC - Sands Secondary) averaged 47 yards on five punts including a long of 52 yards. After two weeks, Karpun is averaging 46.3 yards per punt, which is better than the GNAC all-time record of 44.9 by 10-year NFL veteran Michael Koenen who averaged 44.9 yards for Western Washington in 2002. **Week of Sept. 15-21: Offense** - Tyrell Williams, Western Oregon (WR, 6-4, 200, Sr., Salem, OR - Cascade) caught five passes for 119 yards, including touchdown receptions of 72 and five yards in the second quarter and eight yards in the fourth quarter. The latter score gave the Wolves a 33-21 lead with 8:27 remaining in the game. Williams now ranks 10th in GNAC history in career receiving yards with 2,129 yards and his average per catch of 16.8 ranks ninth. **Defense** - Travis Hansen, Humboldt State (LB, 6-2, 235, Sr., San Anselmo, CA - Siskiyous) helped the Lumberjacks hold Dixie State to 147 yards in total offense (76 rushing and 71 passing) in a 50-3 victory. It was the fewest amount of yards allowed by HSU since it limited Southern Oregon to 112 in 2005 and the 10th lowest in GNAC history. Hansen had six tackles, including a five-yard quarterback sack. He also had a 67-yard interception for a touchdown late in the second quarter as the 'Jacks built up a 36-3 halftime lead. **Special Teams** - John Keating, South Dakota Mines (P, 6-1, 222, Jr., Tucson, AZ - Sabino) averaged 44.3 yards on six punts, including a long of 58. Three of his six punts were inside the 20.

Week of Sept. 22-28: Offense - Trent McKinney, South Dakota Mines (QB, 6-0, 185, Jr., Mililani, HI) set a GNAC record with 503 yards of total offense in leading the Hardrockers to a 62-44 win at William Jewell. McKinney rushed for 206 yards and four touchdowns becoming just the second quarterback in GNAC history to rush for 200 yards in a single game. He also completed 26 of 36 passes for 297 yards and two touchdowns as Mines earned its first victory of the season and extended its string of consecutive quarters in which it has scored to 15. **Defense** - Alex Markarian, Humboldt State (DE, 6-4, 275, Sr., Chino Hills, CA) and Steven Fanua, Azusa Pacific (LB, 6-1, 225, Sr., Milpitas, CA) ... Markarian had five tackles, including 3 1/2 quarterback sacks. He currently ranks fourth in the GNAC and 25th nationally in sacks as he led a HSU defense which had a season-high 10 sacks in a 34-16 win over Western Oregon improving to 4-0 on the season ... Fanua had 13 tackles including five solos in a 42-23 road win at Dixie State as the Cougars allowed the Red Storm just three second-half points outscoring them 21-3 in the final 30 minutes. **Special Teams** - Cedrique Chaney, Central Washington (DB, 6-0, 197, Jr., Kelso, WA) blocked a punt which was picked up and returned 20 yards for a touchdown by Austin Pernell in the first quarter of the Wildcats' 63-7 win against Simon Fraser. Later in the opening quarter Jackson Huerta blocked a punt and Chaney scooped it up and returned it five yards for a TD as the Wildcats built an early 21-7 lead. Chaney also had three tackles.

Week of Sept. 28-Oct. 5: Offense - Terrell Watson, Azusa Pacific (RB, 6-2, 240, Sr., Oxnard, CA) rushed for 256 yards, including a school-record 199 in the opening half, leading the Cougars to a 27-20 win at Central Washington. Watson leads NCAA Division II in rushing with 881 yards, an average of 176.2 per game. He has rushed for nine touchdowns, including two in the first half Saturday as APU built a 27-7 lead at halftime. **Defense** - Jordan Herdman, Simon Fraser (LB, 6-2, 231, So., Winnipeg, MB) had 10 tackles, including 2 1/2 for losses of four yards. He also forced a fumble, which was picked up by his brother Justin and returned 27 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter to give the Clan a 19-6 lead on the way to a 29-19 victory. Jordan leads the GNAC in tackles with 60, and ranks 12th nationally with an average of 12 tackles per game. **Special Teams** - Chris Campbell, Humboldt State (P, 5-11, 175, Sr., Granite Bay, CA) averaged 48.4 yards on five punts, three times pinning South Dakota Mines inside its 20-yard line. He had a season-long of 61 yards. Campbell now leads the GNAC in punting averaging 42.3 yards.

Week of Oct. 6-12: Offense - Terrell Watson, Azusa Pacific (RB, 6-2, 240, Sr., Oxnard, CA) rushed for 200 yards and three touchdowns and also caught two passes for 53 yards as the Cougars rallied from an early 14-0 deficit to defeat previously unbeaten and 24th ranked Humboldt State 55-21 and take over first-place in the GNAC. Watson surpassed the 1,000-yard mark, reaching that figure for the third year in a row. With five regular-season games remaining he already has 1,081 yards this season. **Defense** - Breeon Moreno, Western Oregon (CB, 5-10, 190, Jr., Clarksville, TN) had two key defensive stops in the Wolves' 19-14 win over Dixie State. He recovered a fumble at the WOU 38 to end a Dixie first-quarter drive and jump-start a 62-yard TD march by the Wolves that produced points on a 28-yard pass from Trey Shimabukuro to Paul Reeves. He later sealed the win for WOU with an interception at the four-yard line on a fourth-and-five play on the Red Storm's final possession of the game. He was also credited with one pass breakup in the game. **Special Teams** - Jesse Zalk, Central Washington (WR, 5-8, 160, So., Battle Ground, WA - Prairie) and Jamie Cacciatore, Azusa Pacific (K, 5-8, 175, Jr., Orange, CA) ... Zalk had 210 all-purpose yards including 94 on two kickoffs (62 and 32) in CWU's 61-34 win at South Dakota Mines. He also caught six passes for 116 yards and one touchdown. Cacciatore kicked field goals of 40 and 26 yards, converted on 7-of-7 extra points, averaged 39.6 yards on seven punts (including three

inside the 20) and had four touchbacks among his 10 kickoffs in APU's home win over Humboldt State.

Week of Oct. 13-19: Offense – Ryan Stanford, Simon Fraser (QB, 6-3, 210, Jr., Phoenix, AZ) and Terrell Watson, Azusa Pacific (RB, 6-2, 240, Sr., Oxnard, CA) ... Stanford completed 28 of 36 passes for 372 yards and four touchdowns and wasn't intercepted rallying the Clan from a pair of second-quarter 11-point deficits to a 53-31 win over South Dakota Mines. Stanford threw TD passes of 10 and 4 yards to Lemar Durant and 6 and 35 to Justin Buren. He also netted 14 yards on four rushes to finish with 386 yards in total offense as the Clan improved to 2-1 in GNAC contests ... Watson rushed for 198 yards and tied his own school and GNAC record by scoring five touchdowns as the Cougars defeated Dixie State 49-27. Watson now has 52 touchdowns in three seasons in the GNAC, two shy of the conference career record. He has also rushed for 1,279 yards this season and is college football's current all-division national leader. **Defense** – Steven Fanaa, Azusa Pacific (LB, 6-1, 225, Sr., Milpitas, CA) had 19 tackles, including 10 solos as the Cougars ran their record to 6-1 with their fifth straight victory. Fanaa participated in one-third of the plays in which tackles were credited to the APU defense. Two of his tackles were for losses of eight yards. He also broke up a pass. **Special Teams** - Isaiah Davis, Central Washington (DB/KR, 5-10, 186, Jr., Bremerton, WA – South Kitsap/Eastern Washington) set up three of the Wildcats' four scores, including the game-winner in a 24-20 Homecoming win over Western Oregon. With the score tied 17-17 in the fourth quarter, he returned a 41-yard punt 19 yards to the 29 after a sack by James Fakkema had pinned the Wolves' at their own seven. Five plays later Jake Nelson completed a 14-yard TD pass to Jesse Zalk. In the second quarter, he had a 16-yard return to the WOU 44 which led to a 5 play-44 yard drive and a 14-yard Nelson pass to Kent McKinney for a 14-7 CWU halftime lead. In the third quarter his interception at the WOU 39 set up a 39-yard Sean McDonald field goal, Davis finished the game with five punt returns for 88 yards, including a long of 27.

Week of Oct. 20-26: Offense – Marcus Sanchez, South Dakota Mines (WR, 6-2, 198, Jr., Anaheim, CA - Canyon) and Paul Revis, Western Oregon (WR, 5-9, 165, Fr., Scappoose, OR) ... Sanchez gained 200 yards on 12 catches, both GNAC season highs, as the Hardrockers gained 606 yards in a 52-30 loss to GNAC league-leader Azusa Pacific.. Sanchez's receiving total, which is the eighth highest single-game total in GNAC history, included touchdowns catches of 23 and 20 in the final minute of the second quarter. Revis, who ranks third in Division II in all-purpose yards averaging 205.1 yards per game, caught four passes for 129 yards including two fourth-quarter touchdowns as the Wolves rallied for a 27-16 win over Simon Fraser. Revis' 29-yard TD catch with 7:46 left gave WOU the lead and his 54-yard reception four minutes later iced it. **Defense** – Robert Metz, Dixie State (DB, 6-4, 210, Jr., Tucson, AZ – Canyon Del Oro) had 15 tackles as the Red Storm limited Menlo to 257 yards in a 28-6 home win. Metz had 11 solo tackles and four assists, including one that resulted in a loss. **Special Teams** – Tyree Davis, Azusa Pacific (KR/PR, 5-11, 172, So., Spring Valley, CA) gained 184 yards on just four touches, returning three kickoffs for 119 yards and one punt for a 65-yard first-quarter touchdown. His third kickoff return, which he brought back 53 yards, set up a touchdown after the Hardrockers had cut APU's lead in the fourth quarter to just 11 points.

Week of Oct. 27-Nov. 2: Offense – Terrell Watson, Azusa Pacific (RB, 6-2, 240, Sr., Oxnard, CA) rushed for 202 yards, including an 80-yard touchdown with 2:32 left in the fourth quarter as the Cougars pulled out a 19-18 victory over Western Oregon clinching at least a tie for their second straight GNAC football title. With two regular-season games, remaining Watson already has rushed for 1,687 yards and 22 touchdowns. **Defense** – Jordan Herdman,

Simon Fraser (LB, 6-2, 231, So., Winnipeg, MB – Sturg) and Jeremiah Maluia, Humboldt State (DB, 5-11, 202, Sr., Compton, CA) ... Herdman set three GNAC records in Saturday's 33-17 home loss to Humboldt State. Herdman had 27 total tackles including 19 assists to set single game records in both categories. The old records were 25 by Bubba Reynolds of Humboldt State against Dixie State in 2008 and 16 by Jon Appgar of Western Oregon against Puget Sound in 2005 and by Reynolds against DSU. Herdman also set a GNAC single-season record for tackles, increasing his total to 129 and breaking the record of 128 by Caleb Jessup of Western Washington in 2008 ... Maluia led HSU in the game with nine tackles and also intercepted two passes for 23 yards as the Lumberjacks improved to 7-1 keeping alive their post-season hopes. **Special Teams** – Matthew Hackett, Azusa Pacific (DE, 6-2, 240, Jr., Modesto, CA) blocked a 41-yard field goal attempt with 31 seconds left to preserve the Cougars' 19-18 home win over Western Oregon.

Week of Nov. 3-9: Offense – Ryan Bergman, Western Oregon (QB, 6-2, 170, Sr., Issaquah, WA) completed 28 of 54 passes for 335 yards and three touchdowns leading the Wolves to a 33-31 upset of regionally eighth-ranked Humboldt State. It was his league-leading sixth 300-yard game of the season. Bergman also leads the GNAC this season with 24 touchdown passes, increasing his career total to 56, four off the school record. **Defense** – Trebriel Larry, Western Oregon (DB, 6-0, 185, Fr., Hillsboro, OR) had 11 tackles, including eight solos and four for losses in the Wolves' two-point home win. His four TFL resulted for losses of eight yards. He also had two pass breakups. **Special Teams** – Jesse Zalk, Central Washington (WR, 5-8, 160, So., Battle Ground, WA - Prairie) returned three kickoffs for 124 yards, including a 90-yarder for a touchdown to start the second half. It was the first kickoff return for a TD this fall in the GNAC.

Week of Nov. 10-16: Offense – Jake Nelson, Central Washington (QB, 6-2, 210, So., Lake Stevens, WA) and Terrell Watson, Azusa Pacific (RB, 6-2, 240, Sr., Oxnard, CA) ... Nelson completed 24 of 36 passes for a career-high 410 yards and four touchdowns in a 40-27 win at Simon Fraser. All four touchdown passes came during a 10 minute, 14 second stretch in the second quarter and early in the third quarter. Nelson was also CWU's leading rusher, netting 46 yards on nine carries, including a four-yard TD run to give CWU a 9-6 lead in the opening quarter. Watson rushed for a GNAC-record 338 yards and five touchdowns in a 54-0 over Menlo. Watson finished his season with GNAC single-season records for yards (2,153), carries (319), average per carry (6.7), touchdowns (29) and average per game (195.7). **Defense** – Kraig Akins, Western Oregon (DE, 6-2, 290, Sr., Springfield, OR) had eight tackles, including two tackles for losses in the Wolves' 18-15 win at South Dakota Mines. One of the TFLs was a quarterback sack. He also forced a fumble. Akins finished the season tied for second in the GNAC with 18 TFLs. **Special Teams** – Aubrey Reed, Dixie State (WR/KR, 6-1, 195, Jr., Tacoma, WA – Woodland Hills/C. of the Redwoods) returned a kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown and had five total kickoffs for 155 yard in the Red Storm's loss at Humboldt State.

Week of Aug. 31-Sept. 6: Offensive: Ja'Quan Gardner (Humboldt State, RB, 5-7, 190, So., Ceres, Calif. – Central Valley): Gardner led the Humboldt State offense with 201 yards on 33 carries, helping lead the Lumberjacks to a 27-20 GNAC win over Western Oregon. He scored a touchdown just a minute into the second quarter and also had a game-long 42-yard run in the fourth quarter that helped set up a field goal. **Defensive: Codey Heidebrecht** (Humboldt State, DE, 6-2, 250, Sr., Pleasanton, Calif. – Amador Valley): Heidebrecht was responsible for both of Humboldt State's defensive takeaways in their 27-20 win over Western Oregon. He came up with an interception and returned it for 23 yards in the first quarter, setting up the Lumberjacks' first touchdown. He also forced and recovered a fourth

quarter fumble to go along with four tackles (three solo). **Special Teams: Jacob Hall** (Azusa Pacific, K/P, 6-2, 175, Fr., Greenville, Ill. - Greenville): The freshman kicker had two field goals in the Cougars' 27-24 come-from-behind win at West Texas A&M on Thursday, topped by a 35-yarder with 28 seconds left in the second quarter. He finished going 2 for 3 on the field goals while making all three of his extra-point attempts.

Week of Sept. 7-13: Offensive: Ja'Quan Gardner (Humboldt State, RB, 5-7, 190, So., Ceres, Calif. - Central Valley): Gardner earned his second straight GNAC Player of the Week selection by rushing for a career-high 225 yards and three touchdowns on 25 carries, leading Humboldt State to a 62-41 road win over No. 17 Azusa Pacific. He had touchdown runs of eight, 22 and 51 yards while averaging 8.8 yards per carry. **Defensive: Danny Hankins** (Western Oregon, DB, 5-11, 170, Jr., Portland, Ore. - Grant): Hankins finished with eight tackles and two pass break-ups in the Wolves' home opener against Simon Fraser. He punctuated the game with a 99-yard interception return (one short of the GNAC record) for a touchdown with 1:02 left as the Wolves beat the Clan 31-14. **Special Teams: D.J. Morgan** (Azusa Pacific, KR, 5-11, 180, Sr., Pacioma, Calif. - Univ. of Southern California): Morgan had four kick returns for the Cougars against Humboldt State on Saturday for a total of 141 yards (35.25 per return average), which included a long return of 41 yards.

Week of Sept. 14 -20: Offensive: Robert Webber (Humboldt State, QB, 5-10, 180, So., Corona, Calif. - Corona Centennial): Webber led a solid Humboldt State air attack in the Lumberjacks' 66-7 rout of Dixie State. He completed 15 of 18 passes for 299 yards threw for three touchdowns. In three games, Webber is averaging 205.5 passing yards per game and has a pass efficiency rating of 213.1, which leads Division II. **Defensive: Errik Manning** (Azusa Pacific, LB, 6-1, 240, Sr., Necedah, Wis. - Coll. Of the Desert): Manning led Azusa Pacific in their defensive-minded 16-10 win at Simon Fraser, finishing with 10 tackles (eight solo) with two tackles for loss and a forced fumble. The leading APU tackler, Manning is tied for eighth in the GNAC with 21 tackles. **Special Teams: Jesse Zalk** (Central Washington, WR/KR, 5-8, 160, Jr., Battle Ground, Wash. - Prairie): Zalk finished with 200 all-purpose yards in their 40-19 win over Western Oregon. He had 186 yards on seven returns (four kickoff, three punts), including a 79-yard punt return for a touchdown that put the Wildcats up 14-6 in the first quarter. Zalk leads the GNAC and is ranked 11th in Division II in punt returns (18.8 yards per return).

Week of Sept. 21-27: Offensive: Kurt Scoby (Azusa Pacific, RB, 5-8, 190, Fr., Duarte, Calif. - Fresno State Univ.): Scoby led Azusa Pacific to a 34-5 GNAC road victory at Dixie State. He rushed 18 times for 157 yards and two touchdowns, which included a 49-yard scoring run early in the fourth quarter. Scoby enters the week ranked second in the GNAC in rushing with 114.2 yards per game. **Defensive: Justin Herdman** (Simon Fraser, LB, 6-1, 233, Jr., Winnipeg, Man. - Sturgeon Heights Collegiate): Herdman led the Simon Fraser defense with 13 tackles, four tackles for loss (for 28 yards), 1.5 sacks (for 12 yards), a forced fumble and an interception. He combined with his brother, Jordan, for 28 of the Clan's 67 tackles. Justin Herdman is ranked second in the GNAC in tackles and leads the league in tackles for loss. **Special Teams: Robbie Gerarden** (South Dakota Mines, K, 5-10, 168, Fr., Black Diamond, Wash. - O'Dea): Gerarden went 6 for 6 in point-after attempts and also kicked a 22-yard field goal in the third quarter in South Dakota Mines' 51-10 victory over Lyon.

Week of Sept. 28-Oct. 3: Offensive: Kurt Scoby (Azusa Pacific, RB, 5-8, 190, Fr., Duarte, Calif. - Fresno State Univ.): Scoby led Azusa Pacific to a 34-5 GNAC road victory at Dixie State. He rushed 18 times for 157 yards and two touchdowns, which included a 49-yard scoring run early in the fourth quarter. Scoby enters the week ranked second in the GNAC in

rushing with 114.2 yards per game. **Defensive: Justin Herdman** (Simon Fraser, LB, 6-1, 233, Jr., Winnipeg, Man. - Sturgeon Heights Collegiate): Herdman led the Simon Fraser defense with 13 tackles, four tackles for loss (for 28 yards), 1.5 sacks (for 12 yards), a forced fumble and an interception. He combined with his brother, Jordan, for 28 of the Clan's 67 tackles. Justin Herdman is ranked second in the GNAC in tackles and leads the league in tackles for loss. **Special Teams: Robbie Gerarden** (South Dakota Mines, K, 5-10, 168, Fr., Black Diamond, Wash. - O'Dea): Gerarden went 6 for 6 in point-after attempts and also kicked a 22-yard field goal in the third quarter in South Dakota Mines' 51-10 victory over Lyon.

Week of Oct. 5-11: Offensive: Ja'Quan Gardner (Humboldt State, RB, 5-7, 190, So., Ceres, Calif. - Central Valley): Gardner rushed for a school-record 305 yards on 36 carries and scored three touchdowns as he led the Lumberjacks to a 34-16 victory over defending GNAC champion Azusa Pacific. He had 142 of those yards in the first quarter alone. In addition, he threw on a trick play for 66 yards and a touchdown. **Devin Nixon** (South Dakota Mines, RB, 5-11, 190, Fr., Savannah, Ga. - Groves): Nixon finished with 251 all-purpose yards touchdowns to lead the Hardrockers to a 49-44 victory over Central Washington. He carried 30 times for 160 yards and a pair of touchdowns and also caught three passes for 91 yards and a touchdown. His two rushing touchdowns in the fourth quarter proved to be the winning scores in the game. **Defensive: Jonathan Breland** (Western Oregon, LB 6-2, 235, Sr., Berkeley, Calif. - Merced JC): Breland had two critical interceptions that helped the Wolves clinch their 24-22 upset of No. 6 ranked North Alabama. The first pick led to the Wolves' first touchdown with 4:08 left in the first quarter and the second interception stopped UNA's final drive of the game. Breland also had four tackles, a tackle for loss and a forced fumble. **Special Teams: Nikolai Karpun** (Simon Fraser, K/P, 6-0, 203, Sr., North Delta, B.C. - Sands Secondary): Karpun punted seven times against Dixie State, averaging 43.7 yards per punt, and had one inside the 20-yard line. His ledger included a long punt of 49 yards.

Week of Oct. 12-18: Offensive: Trent McKinney (South Dakota Mines, QB, 6-0, 198, Sr., Mililani, Hawaii): McKinney finished with 347 yards of total offense and had a role in both touchdowns in the Hardrockers' 19-0 shutout of Simon Fraser. He completed 29 of 38 passes for 228 yards and a touchdown and also rushed 11 times for 119 yards and rushed for a touchdown. It was South Dakota Mines' first shutout since 2008. **Defensive: Shane Kuenzi** (Western Oregon, LB, 6-0, 215, Sr., Salem, Ore. - West Salem) Kuenzi led Western Oregon with 11 tackles in the Wolves' 31-25 win over Central Washington. His two field goals were from 37 yards and 38 yards.

Week of Oct. 2-8: Offensive: Reilly Hennessey (Central Washington, QB, 6-3, Jr., Camas, Wash. – Eastern Washington Univ.): Hennessey finished with 334 yards of total offense and five touchdowns in the Wildcats' 55-27 victory over Humboldt State. He completed 21 of 30 passes for 216 yards and five touchdowns and also led CWU in rushing with 118 yards on 13 carries. In all, Hennessey accounted for 61 percent of the Wildcats' total yards as they improved to 6-0 on the season. **Defensive: Kevin Haynes** (Central Washington, LB, 6-1, Sr., Battle Ground, Wash. – Battle Ground): The 2016 GNAC Defensive Player of the Year finished with 14 tackles (4 solos) with a tackle for loss and a half-sack in the Wildcats' 55-27 win over Humboldt State. Haynes keyed a CWU defense that limited the Lumberjacks to 367 yards of total offense (were averaging 534 yards per game entering the contest). **Special Teams: Gavin Cobb** (Simon Fraser, WR/KR, 5-7, So., Victoria, B.C. – Mount Douglas): Cobb set a GNAC single-game record with 295 yards on nine kickoff returns in the Clan's loss at home to Western Oregon. He set a Simon Fraser record with his 99-yard kickoff return in the first quarter.

Week of Oct. 9-15: Offensive: Ja'Quan Gardner (Humboldt State, RB, 5-7, Sr., Ceres, Calif. – Central Valley): Gardner had a record-setting night in the Lumberjacks' 52-49 win over Azusa Pacific. He finished with a GNAC single-game record 446 all-purpose yards and six touchdowns and tied a record with five rushing touchdowns. He had 293 rushing yards on 31 carries, three receiving yards and 150 kickoff return yards on five returns and a touchdown. In the process, Gardner set GNAC career marks in touchdowns scored (67), points (402), all-purpose yards (6,366) and rushing yards (5,124) and tied the GNAC career with his 63rd rushing touchdown.

He also went 7 for 7 on point-after attempts and averaged 63 yards per kickoff on nine kickoffs with four touchbacks.

Week of Oct. 16-22: Offensive: Austin Pernel (Central Washington, RB, 5-9, Sr., Kent, Wash. – Washington State Univ.): Pernel scored both of Central Washington's touchdowns, including the game-winning touchdown with 10:42 to go, as the Wildcats scored a 17-10 win over North Alabama. He finished with career-high 189 rushing yards on 35 carries as CWU rushed for a total of 235 yards. **Defensive: Jason Schwartz** (Azusa Pacific, DE, 6-4, Sr., Santa Barbara, Calif. – Dos Pueblos): Schwartz finished with three sacks and three tackles for loss, setting Simon Fraser back 29 yards, in Azusa Pacific's 61-0 shutout of the Clan on Saturday. The sacks were a career high for Schwartz and he has an APU leading eight sacks on the season. He helped Azusa Pacific limit Simon Fraser to 112 yards of total offense. **Special Teams: Paul Revis** (Western Oregon, WR/KR, 5-9, Sr., Scappoose, Ore. – Scappoose): Revis had a pair of punt returns for 100 yards, including a 90-yard return for a touchdown in the second quarter in the Wolves' 42-32 loss to Humboldt State. The return was the second longest in both WOU and GNAC history. Revis finished the day with 189 all-purpose yards with 89 receiving yards.

Week of Oct. 23-29: Offensive: Chase Krivashei (Humboldt State, WR, 5-9, Sr., Corona, Calif. – Centennial): Krivashei became the Lumberjacks' all-time receptions leader as he finished with seven catches for 103 yards and two touchdowns in a 47-7 win over Simon Fraser. His 294 catches eclipsed the record of 293 set by Dustin Creager (2001-04). Both of Krivashei's touchdowns came in the first quarter as the Lumberjacks staked themselves to a 28-0 first quarter lead. Krivashei also had two punt returns for 69 yards, which included a 59-yard return that led the Lumberjacks' fourth touchdown. **Defensive: Tyler Hasty** (Central Washington, LB, 6-1, Sr., Battle Ground, Wash. – Battle Ground): Hasty finished with four tackles and a Central Washington single-game record with five pass breakups in the Wildcats' 34-23 win over Azusa Pacific. Two of those breakups came on third down and the fifth was deflected to teammate Max McIntosh for an interception. **Special Teams: Jonathan Kuhn** (Central Washington, P, 5-11, Sr., Mercer Island, Wash. – Mercer Island): Kuhn averaged 41.3 yards per punt on three attempts in Saturday's 34-23 win over Azusa Pacific. His performance included a long 52-yard punt that pinned the Cougars inside the 10-yard line late in the fourth quarter.

Week of Oct. 30-Nov. 5: Offensive: Robert Webber (Humboldt State, QB, 5-9, Sr., Corona, Calif. – Corona Centennial): Webber completed 21 of 29 passes for 380 yards and three touchdowns to lead Humboldt State to a 48-3 road win at Western State on Saturday. With the performance, the senior moved into first in NCAA Division II in passing efficiency (194.4) and yards per pass attempt (11.09). **Hasani Childs** (Central Washington, RB, 5-7, So., University Place, Wash. – Curtis): Childs rushed 27 times for 226 yards, the second-best rushing performance in the GNAC this season, and scored three touchdowns in Central Washington's 51-0 win at Simon Fraser. Childs also had two kick returns for 32 yards. **Defensive: Bo Highburger** (Western Oregon, LB, 6-1, Jr., Veneta, Ore. – Elmira): Highburger led Western Oregon with 15 tackles, including seven solo tackles, and had one fumble recovery in the Wolves' 41-16 loss to Azusa Pacific. It is the second most

tackles by a GNAC player this season. **Special Teams: Aaron Berry** (Azusa Pacific, S, 6-2, Jr., Perris, Calif. – Perris): Berry had a pair of blocked kicks, one on a PAT and one of a punt that led to a fourth-quarter touchdown, as Azusa Pacific won at Western Oregon, 41-16. He also led the Azusa Pacific defense with six tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss.

Week of Nov. 6-12: Andrew Elffers (Azusa Pacific, QB, 6-3, Sr., Arcadia, Calif. – Maranatha): Elffers closed his collegiate by tying the GNAC and Azusa Pacific single-game records with six touchdowns in the Cougars' 56-35 win over Colorado Mesa. Elffers completed 21 of 37 passes for 333 yards and also rushed 12 times for 37 yards. **Defensive: Billy Greer** (Central Washington, DL, 6-1, So., Tacoma, Wash. – Wilson): Greer finished with four tackles, which included three sacks for 23 yards of loss and one forced fumble to help lead the Wildcats to the GNAC championship with a 42-28 road win over Humboldt State. **Special Teams: Jacob Hall** (Azusa Pacific, K/P, 6-2, Jr., Greenville, Ill. – Greenville): Active on both offense and defense, Hall made all eight extra-point opportunities and also punted six times for an average of 30.8 yards per punt in the Cougars 56-35 win over Colorado Mesa.

Week of Aug. 29-Sept. 2: Offensive: Zikel Reddick (Azusa Pacific, RB, 5-10, 215, So., Riverhead, N.Y. – Grace Brethren): Reddick rushed for 201 yards and a touchdown on 27 carries to help lead the Cougars to a 17-7 victory over West Texas A&M on Saturday. He became the first running back in APU history to rush for 200 or more yards in his first career start. His 10-yard touchdown run with 4:32 left in the first half provided the Cougars a 14-0 lead. **Defensive: Aaron Berry** (Azusa Pacific, LB, 6-2, 225, Sr., Perris, Calif. – Perris): Berry led the Azusa Pacific defense with 14 tackles, including nine solo tackles, two sacks and 5.5 tackles for loss as the Cougars scored a 17-7 win over West Texas A&M on Saturday. He led an APU defense that limited West Texas A&M to 76 rushing yards, 4 of 15 on third-down conversions and 1 of 4 on red-zone scoring opportunities. **Special Teams: Kees Metselaar** (Simon Fraser, P/K, 6-2, 200, Fr., Port Orchard, Wash. – South Kitsap): Metselaar went 6 of 8 on point-after opportunities and punted twice for 77 yards (38.5 yards per punt average) in the Clan's 54-7 rout of Willamette. Cooper also caught one pass for 12 yards to finish 190 all-purpose yards. **Defensive: Bo Highburger** (Western Oregon, LB, 6-0, 220, Sr., Veneta, Ore. – Elmira):

Week of Sept. 16-22: Offensive: Omari Land (Western Oregon, RB, 5-11, 185, So., Oakland, Calif. – San Leandro): Land was a big factor in the Wolves 42-36 GNAC season-opening win at Azusa Pacific. Land rushed for 122 yards on 18 carries with three touchdowns and a long rush of 31 yards. He contributed what proved to be the winning touchdown in the fourth quarter, making his 10-yard scoring run with 9:43 left in the game. **Defensive: Tyrell Cummings** (Western Oregon, DL, 6-0, 315, Fr., Seattle, Wash. – Univ. of Central Oklahoma): Cummings was one of three Western Oregon players to finish with seven tackles in the Wolves' 42-36 win at Azusa Pacific. He had two solo tackles, 2.5 tackles for loss for 11 yards, one sack for seven yards and forced a fumble. **Special Teams: Gavin Todd** (Central Washington, P/K, 6-2, 190, Sr., Simi Valley, Calif. – Moorpark Coll.): Todd set a GNAC single-game record by connecting on five field goals in the Wildcats' 36-27 win at Western New Mexico. He connected on four of his five field goals in the second half and twice hit for a long of 38 yards. The five field goals surpassed the GNAC record of four reached on seven occasions, most recently Jamie Cacciatore of Azusa Pacific in 2013. Combined with his three extra-point conversions, Todd scored 18 points kicking to surpass the GNAC record of 16 in a game, most recently accomplished by Jacob Hall of Azusa Pacific in 2018.

Week of Sept. 23-29: Offensive: Ty Currie (Western Oregon, QB, 6-2, 205, Sr., Yreka, Calif. – Yreka): Currie played a role in all five touchdowns and finished with 233 all-purpose yards in Western Oregon's 36-26 win at Central Washington, the Wolves' first win in Ellensburg since 1998. He completed 12 of 22 passes for 171 yards and a pair of touchdowns while also rushing 16 times for 62 yards and three more touchdowns. The offensive effort helped Western Oregon jump out to a 2-0 GNAC record. **Defensive: Curtis Anderson** (Western Oregon, DB, 6-2, 205, Jr., Klamath Falls, Ore. – Mazama): Anderson posted a GNAC single-game high of two interceptions, both of which Western Oregon converted into touchdowns in a 36-26 win at Central Washington. Anderson also finished with four tackles and a pass breakup. On special teams, Anderson had two kickoff returns for a total of 24 yards. **Special Teams: Eric Wilkes** (Central Washington, RB, 5-6, 195, Jr., Las Vegas, Nev. – Weber State Univ.): Wilkes led the Wildcats with five kickoff returns for a total of 104 yards. His ledger included a long return of 25 yards in the third quarter.

Week of Sept. 30-Oct. 6: Offensive: Christian Moore (Central Washington, QB, 6-5, So., Puyallup, Wash. – Bellarmine Prep): Moore entered in the second quarter of Saturday's game at West Texas A&M and proceeded to complete 18 of 31 passes for 339 yards and four touchdowns. He threw for three of those scores in the fourth quarter, allowing the Wildcats to come back from a 41-10 deficit in the eventual 48-41 loss. **Defensive: Jaylin Parnell** (Western Oregon, LB, 6-0, So., Medford, Ore. – South Medford): Parnell led the defensive charge in the Wolves' 51-14 win over Simon Fraser with seven tackles, including five solo tackles, to go along with a half-sack and half-tackle for loss. He also had the game's only interception and a 17-yard return, which the offense later turned into a touchdown. **Special Teams: Andrew Gross** (Western Oregon, K/P, 6-1, Jr., Gladstone, Ore. – Corban Univ.): Gross was effective in all aspects of the kicking game in the Wolves' 51-14 win over Simon Fraser. He made all seven of his point-after attempts and also connected on a 37-yard field goal

in the fourth quarter. Gross also punted four times for an average of 44.3 yards per punt and kicked off nine times for 527 yards and a 58.6 yards per kickoff average.

Week of Oct. 7-13: Offensive: Christian Moore (Central Washington, QB, 6-5, So., Puyallup, Wash. – Bellarmine Prep): Making his first collegiate start, Moore finished with 493 yards of total offense in Central Washington's 44-6 win over Azusa Pacific. He completed 26 of 37 passes for 423 yards and five touchdowns and also carried the ball 11 times for 70 yards. Moore has finished with more than 300 yards of passing offense in each of the last two games. **Defensive: Curtis Anderson** (Western Oregon, DB, 6-2, Jr., Klamath Falls, Ore. – Mazama): Anderson posted his second two-interception game of the season in the Wolves 26-14 road win at Texas A&M-Kingsville. The second of those interceptions was converted into a critical third-quarter touchdown. Anderson also finished with four tackles in the win. **Special Teams: Marquis Sampson** (Western Oregon, WR, 5-7, So., Portland, Ore. – Madison): Sampson had just one kickoff return in Saturday's game at Texas A&M-Kingsville, but it was huge. Sampson returned the Javelinas' first kickoff 67 yards. That set up the Wolves' first touchdown three plays later and set the momentum for the 26-14 road win.

Week of Oct. 14-20: Offensive: Rysen John (Simon Fraser, WR, 6-7, Sr., Vancouver, B.C. – Douglas Coll.): John finished with eight catches for 109 yards and three touchdowns to lead Simon Fraser to a 24-17 win over Azusa Pacific, the Clan's first GNAC victory since 2014. John scored all three touchdowns in the second half, including the go-ahead score with one second left in the third quarter and one on a 25-yard reception from Brandon Nicksich in the fourth quarter. **Defensive: Ian Crocker** (Simon Fraser, LB, 6-1, Fr., Seattle, Wash. – Ballard): Crocker led the Simon Fraser defense with eight tackles, 3.5 tackles for loss for 20 yards and two sacks for 18 yards as the Clan limited Azusa Pacific to 208 yards of total offense in a 24-17 win over the Cougars on the road. **Special Teams: Patrick Hegarty** (Central Washington, P/K, 6-4, So., Ferndale, Wash. – Simon Fraser Univ.): Hegarty played a critical role in the punting game in the Wildcats' 42-41 overtime win at Western Oregon. He punted five times, averaging 39.8 yards per punt with a long punt of 49 yards and two punts inside the 20-yard line.

Week of Oct. 21-27: Offensive: Michael Roots (Central Washington, RB, 5-10, Jr., Sacramento, Calif. – Southern Oregon Univ.): Roots carried 14 times for a GNAC season-high of 221 yards and three touchdowns in Central Washington's 62-10 win over Simon Fraser. He also caught two passes for 16 yards to finish with 237 all-purpose yards. In the process, Roots surpassed 2,000 rushing yards for his CWU career, making him the 15th in GNAC history to cross that plateau. **Defensive: Grady Graff** (Central Washington, LB, 6-0, Sr., Pasco, Wash. – Chiawana): Graff led the Central Washington defense with nine tackles, 1.5 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks in the Wildcats' 62-10 win over Simon Fraser. He also forced a fumble in the first quarter, which the Wildcats converted into a field goal. **Special Teams: Ramzee Jaridly** (Azusa Pacific, P/K, 6-1, Fr., Chino Hills, Calif. – Ayala): Jaridly made both of his field goals in the Cougars' 49-27 loss to Colorado Mines on Saturday, connecting on kicks of 35 yards and 45 yards. The 45-yarder was a career-long. Jaridly now has three field goals of 40 yards or longer this season.

Week of Oct. 28-Nov. 3: Offensive: Michael Roots (Central Washington, RB, 5-10, Jr., Sacramento, Calif. – Southern Oregon Univ.): Roots earned the offensive honor for the second consecutive week after he rushed for 196 yards on 22 carries and finished with 245 all-purpose yards in the Wildcats' 27-24 win at Azusa Pacific. Roots rushed for one touchdown on a six-yard run in the first quarter and also caught two passes for 23 yards and returned one kick for 26 yards. **Defensive: Jaylin Parnell** (Western Oregon, LB, 6-0, So., Medford, Ore. – South Medford): Parnell finished with six solo tackles in

the Wolves' 45-14 win at Simon Fraser on Saturday. He had two sacks in the game, one of which resulted in a fumble, which was returned for a touchdown. **Special Teams: Patrick Hegarty** (Central Washington, P/K, 6-4, So., Ferndale, Wash. – Simon Fraser Univ.): Hegarty made a difference in the kicking game in the Wildcats' 27-24 win at Azusa Pacific. He made a pair of field goals from 22 and 29 yards, with the 29-yarder in the fourth quarter providing the game-winning score. Hegarty also punted three times, averaging 34 yards per punt, and kicked off six times for an average of 56.7 yards per kick.

Week of Nov. 4-10: Offensive: Ty Currie (Western Oregon, QB, 6-2, Sr., Yreka, Calif. – Yreka): Currie finished with 335 yards of total offense as the Wolves clinched a share of the GNAC title in a 23-21 win over Azusa Pacific. He completed 12 of 16 passes for 157 yards and a touchdown while also carrying the ball 22 times for 178 yards and another touchdown. He completed passes to six different receivers and had three passes over 30 yards while also finishing with a long run of 32 yards. **Defensive: Patrick Rogers** (Central Washington, DB, 5-11, Fr., Tacoma, Wash. – Lincoln): Rogers had two of the Wildcats' four interceptions in the 72-17 rout of Southwest Baptist on Saturday. He ran his fourth-quarter interception back 85 yards for a touchdown. In addition, Rogers finished with three tackles as the Wildcats limited Southwest Baptist to 252 yards of total offense. **Special Teams: Nate Proctor, Jr.** (Western Oregon, LB, 6-2, Sr., Seattle, Wash. – O'Dea): Proctor blocked Azusa Pacific's last-second 37-yard field goal attempt to preserve Western Oregon's 23-21 victory as the team clinched a share of the GNAC title. Proctor also had four tackles and a sack in the victory.

Week of Nov. 11-17: Offensive: Christian Moore (Central Washington, QB, 6-5, So., Puyallup, Wash. – Bellarmine Prep): Moore completed 16 of 34 passes for 234 yards and four touchdowns and also rushed five times for 24 yards and a touchdown as the Wildcats clinched a share of the GNAC championship with a 51-14 win over Simon Fraser. He finished with 258 yards of total offense while spreading his passes between eight different receivers. **Defensive: Tevin Gray** (Central Washington, LB, 5-11, Sr., Lake Stevens, Wash. – Lake Stevens): Gray finished with five tackles, including four solo tackles, and forced a fumble as the Central Washington defense allowed just 261 yards of total offense in a 51-14 win over Simon Fraser. Gray also recovered a blocked punt in the first quarter and ran it back two yards for the game's first touchdown. **Special Teams: Patrick Hegarty** (Central Washington, P/K, 6-4, So., Ferndale, Wash. – Simon Fraser Univ.): Hegarty went 6 for 7 on point-after opportunities and also nailed a 27-yard field goal in the fourth quarter in the Wildcats' 51-14 win over Simon Fraser. Hegarty also punted three times for an average of 37 yards per punt and kicked off nine times for an average of 50.7 yards per kick.

He also rushed five times for 13 yards and a touchdown. It was Lemming's first career start and contributed to a GNAC single-game record seven touchdown passes. **Defensive: Donte Hamilton** (Central Washington, LB, 6-3, Sr., Mukilteo, Wash. – Saddleback CC): Hamilton finished with eight tackles, including seven solo tackles, had two tackles for loss for 12 yards and one sack for five yards in the Wildcats' 66-24 win at Eastern New Mexico. The effort helped CWU limit the Greyhounds to 316 yards of total offense. **Special Teams: Patrick Hegarty** (Central Washington, P/K, 6-4, Jr., Ferndale, Wash. – Simon Fraser Univ.): Hegarty went a perfect 9 for 9 in extra-point opportunities, one short of the GNAC single-game record, and added a 43-yard field goal in Central Washington's 66-24 win over Eastern New Mexico.

Defensive: Jaylin Parnell (Western Oregon, LB, 6-0, Jr., Medford, Ore. – South Medford): Parnell led the Western Oregon defense with nine tackles, including six solo tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss, in the Wolves' 24-10 loss at Texas A&M-Kingsville. **Special Teams: Kristie Elliott** (Simon Fraser, K, 5-8, So., North Vancouver, B.C. – Windsor): Elliott became the first Canadian woman to play in and score in an NCAA football game, converting on two-point after conversions in Simon Fraser's 56-20 loss at Linfield.

Week of Sept. 13-19: Offensive: Rashaad Boddie (Central Washington, RB, 6-2, Jr., Clayton, N.C. – Skyline): Boddie carried the ball 25 times for 279 yards and three touchdowns and 284 all-purpose yards to lead Central Washington in its 36-14 win at Simon Fraser to open GNAC play. The rushing performance was the eighth-best in GNAC history and the most by a CWU player since 2010. **Defensive: Kolby Buljevic** (Simon Fraser, DB, 6-1, Jr., Burnaby, B.C. – St. Thomas More Collegiate): Buljevic led all players with 13 tackles, including eight solo tackles, and two tackles for loss for five yards in Simon Fraser's 36-14 loss to Central Washington. The defensive effort helped keep SFU within one point of the Wildcats at halftime. **Special Teams: Andrew Gross** (K/P, 6-1, Sr., Gladstone, Ore. – Corban Univ.): Gross averaged 36.7 yards per punt on six punts, which included a long punt of 49 yards and two that landed inside the 20-yard line in Western Oregon's 21-7 loss to Division I-FCS Portland State.

Week of Sept. 20-26: Offensive: Omari Land (Western Oregon, RB, 5-11, Jr., Oakland, Calif. – San Leandro): Land posted the conference's second 200-plus rushing yard performance of the season, carrying 25 times for 209 yards and two touchdowns in the Wolves' 24-7 victory at Simon Fraser. He scored the game's opening touchdown on a one-yard run in the second quarter and then broke off a 42-yard scoring run on the first drive of the third quarter. **Defensive: Donte Hamilton** (Central Washington, LB, 6-3, Sr., Mukilteo, Wash. – Saddleback JC): Hamilton led a solid defensive effort for Central Washington, finishing with nine tackles, 3.5 tackles for loss for 21 yards, two sacks for 17 yards, two pass breakups and a fumble recovery in the Wildcats' close 14-9 loss to Angelo State. He led a CWU defense that allowed just 253 yards of total offense, the fewest since late in the 2019 season. **Special Teams: Marquis Sampson** (WR, 5-7, Jr., Portland, Ore. – Madison): Sampson finished with 110 all-purpose yards in Western Oregon's 24-7 win at Simon Fraser. Sampson returned five punts for 56 yards, averaging 11.2 yards per return. He also returned the opening kickoff of the second half 52 yards, which set up Omari Land's third-quarter touchdown.

Week of Sept. 27-Oct. 3: Offensive: Ryan Worthley (Western Oregon, QB, 6-2, Jr., Tigard, Ore. – Tigard): Worthley completed 28 of 35 passes for 379 yards and two touchdowns to lead Western Oregon to a 41-38 win over West Texas A&M. He had a long pass of 56 yards, which resulted in a Thomas Wright touchdown in the second quarter and went 5 of 6 in the final drive of the game that resulted in the winning touchdown. **Defensive: Donte Hamilton** (Central Washington, LB, 6-3, Sr., Mukilteo, Wash. – Saddleback JC): Hamilton led Central Washington with 10 tackles and tied the GNAC single-game record with three interceptions in the Wildcats' 30-20 upset of No. 11 Midwestern State. He also had 1.5 tackles for loss. Hamilton had 58 return yards on his three interceptions, one of which led to a key late fourth-quarter touchdown. **Special Teams: Patrick Hegarty** (Central Washington, P/K, 6-4, Jr., Ferndale, Wash. – Simon Fraser Univ.): Hegarty proved the offensive difference in the Wildcats' 30-20 upset of No. 11 Midwestern State, making three extra-point opportunities and converting field goals of 45 yards, 38 yards and a career-long 50 yards. Two of those field goals came

in the fourth quarter as the Wildcats outscored the Mustangs 13-0 in the final 15 minutes.

Week of Oct. 4-10: Offensive: Tyler Flanagan (Central Washington, RB, 6-0, Fr., Woodland, Wash. – Woodland): Flanagan carried the ball 12 times for 93 yards and scored two touchdowns in Central Washington's 45-14 win over Western Oregon. Both of his touchdowns came in the third quarter on an eight-yard run and a game-long 35-yard run. **Defensive: Zach Stecklein** (Central Washington, DL, 6-6, Sr., Mt. Horeb, Iowa – St. Cloud St. Univ.): Stecklein led the Central Washington defense with six solo tackles, four tackles for loss for 22 yards and three sacks in Saturday's 45-14 win over Western Oregon. He was the key cog in a CWU defense that allowed WOU 254 total offense yards. **Special Teams: Curtis Anderson** (Western Oregon, DB, 6-2, Sr., Klamath Falls, Ore. – Mazama): Anderson paced the return game for Western Oregon in Saturday's 45-14 loss to Central Washington, taking five kick returns for a total of 96 yards.

Week of Oct. 11-17: Offensive: Riley Morrison (Simon Fraser, WR, 5-8, So., Bothell, Wash. – Bothell): Morrison led the Simon Fraser receiving corps, making five catches for 77 yards and the team's first touchdown of the game en route to a 30-3 victory at Montana State Northern on Saturday. **Defensive: Griffin Barrett** (Simon Fraser, LB, 5-11, Sr., Moose Jaw, Sask. – A.E. Peacock): Barrett led all defensive players with 13 tackles, including seven solo tackles, in Simon Fraser's 30-3 win at Montana State Northern. He paced an SFU defense that limited the Lights to 266 yards of total offense, forced five turnovers and held MSUN to 0 for 7 on fourth-down conversions. **Special Teams: Issac Muckian** (Simon Fraser, LB, 6-0, Jr., Olympia, Wash. – Olympia): Muckian made the signature special teams play of the game for Simon Fraser, recovering a blocked punt early in the second quarter for a touchdown in the 30-3 win at Montana State Northern on Saturday.

Week of Oct. 18-24: Offensive: Darius Morrison (Central Washington, WR, 6-3, So., Puyallup, Wash. – Puyallup): Morrison caught four passes for 102 yards and two touchdowns as Central Washington clinched the GNAC title with a 53-21 win over Western Oregon. His day included a 40-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter. It was the first 100-plus yard performance for a CWU receiver this season and the first of Morrison's career. **Defensive: Curtis Anderson** (Western Oregon, S, 6-2, Sr., Klamath Falls, Ore. – Mazama): Anderson had a solid individual effort in the Wolves' 53-21 loss to Central Washington. He tied with teammate Jaylin Parnell for the team lead with 10 tackles, which included five solo tackles, three tackles for loss, a forced fumble and a pass breakup. Anderson also had two kick returns on special teams for 47 yards. **Special Teams: Patrick Hegarty** (Central Washington, P/K, 6-4, Jr., Ferndale, Wash. – Simon Fraser Univ.): Hegarty went 6 for 6 on point-after attempts and made a 39-yard field goal in the first quarter in the Wildcats' 53-21 win over Western Oregon. He is now 30 for 30 on point-after attempts this season.

Week of Oct. 25-31: Offensive: Omari Land (Western Oregon, RB, 5-11, Jr., Oakland, Calif. – San Leandro): Land carried 20 times for 133 yards and a touchdown in Western Oregon's 42-3 victory over Simon Fraser. He averaged 6.7 per rushing attempt to lead a 286-yard rushing afternoon for the Wolves. **Defensive: Machiah Lee** (Western Oregon, DB, 5-11, Jr., Spanaway, Wash. – Bethel): Lee led the Western Oregon defense with six tackles, including five solo tackles, a sack and two tackles for loss for 11 yards in Western Oregon's 42-3 win over Simon Fraser. **Special Teams: Patrick Hegarty** (Central Washington, P/K, 6-4, Jr., Ferndale, Wash. – Simon Fraser Univ.): Hegarty tied the GNAC single-game record with 10 extra-points made in Central Washington's 92-0 rout of Lincoln (Calif.). He tied a record held by three other players, most recently Western Oregon's

Week of Nov. 1-7: Offensive: Quincy Glasper (Central Washington, QB, 6-3, Fr., Stockton, Calif. – Bear Creek): Glasper passed for a career-high 452 yards and threw five touchdowns in Central Washington's 54-29 win at Western New Mexico. He also ran nine times for 46 yards to finish with 498 yards of total offense. It was the 13th best passing performance in GNAC history and the second-best for a CWU quarterback in the GNAC era. **Defensive: Zach Stecklein** (Central Washington, DL, 6-6, Sr., Mt. Horeb, Wis. – St. Cloud State Univ.): Stecklein finished with six tackles, including three tackles for loss for 17 yards, two sacks for 14 yards and a forced fumble in Central Washington's 54-29 win at Western New Mexico. **Special Teams: Curtis Anderson** (Western Oregon, DB, 6-2, Sr., Klamath Falls, Ore. – Mazama): Anderson returned three kickoffs for 65 yards, including a long return of 30 yards, in the Wolves' 45-7 loss at Chadron State. Defensively, Anderson also finished with six tackles, two tackles for loss and a sack.

Week of Nov. 8-15: Offensive: Quincy Glasper (Central Washington, QB, 6-3, Fr., Stockton, Calif. – Bear Creek): Glasper completed 18 of 25 passes for 289 yards and five touchdowns and also rushed eight times for 32 yards and two more touchdowns in Central Washington's 70-0 rout of Simon Fraser to end the regular season. It was Glasper's second straight game with five passing touchdowns, the first CWU player to accomplish the feat since 2017. **Defensive: Jaylin Parnell** (Western Oregon, LB, 6-0, Jr., Medford, Ore. – South Medford): Parnell led the WOU defense in Saturday's 55-16 over Lincoln (Calif.), finishing with six solo tackles, four tackles for loss for 13 yards and three sacks for 12 yards. **Special Teams: Aidan Pearce** (Simon Fraser, WR, 6-1, Jr., North Vancouver, B.C. – Argyle): Pearce had five kickoff returns for Simon Fraser for 93 yards, averaging 18.6 yards per return in Saturday's 70-0 loss at Central Washington.
